Frank H. Stanton, recently appointed county fruit inspector, says that owners of fruit and decorative shrubbery will be required the coming year to observe the letter horticultural laws

that call for effective application of sprays. Many failed last year to observe the law. The new fruit inspector says that city apple tree owners must not only apply a spray of lime-sulphur solution, which controls San Jose scale and other fungi pests, but that they must also spray with arsenate of lead for the elimination of the coding moth pest.

STOLEN CAR FOUND ON MOSIER ROAD

Because the machine was in poor working order, Chas. H. Gastner did not believe that thieves who stole his automobile Monday night of last week, would be able to proceed very far, and Friday Roy Cooper was sent out by Sheriff Johnson to survey the roads and byways between here and Mosier. Mr. Cooper was rewarded after traveling less than a mile over the old hill road connecting the Valley with the Mosier fruit district.

The car was found, wrecked, evidently by too much speed at a short turn. The machine had skidded over an embankment and was resting with its top against a number of scrub oaks. Except for the smashed top no damage resulted.

Mr. Gastner's car was the first ever stolen here. In his efforts to recover the machine and apprehend the thieves Sheriff Johnson had notified every county in Oregon and the sheriffs of southern Washington.

A small amount of gasoline was stolen on Monday night from the automobile tank of T. L. W. Blount, a neighbor of Mr. Gastner. About 11 o'clock on the same night two men appeared at the Fashion Stables, where they purchased a can of gasoline. They stated that their car was stalled just east of the Blount River bridge. Night Marshal William Hart held a lantern while an attendant at the livery stable drew the gasoline for the men.

HIGH SCHOOL NOTES

Last Wednesday noon a yell practice was held at which the high school students, and particularly the freshmen, showed a great deal of pep.

Beginning classes in French were started last week for this semester.

Colonel John Leader, Commandant Oregon State Officers' Training Camp, University of Oregon, will talk to the high school students Friday, 31st. In the evening, Friday, 31st, Colonel Leader will deliver an address on the general subject of military preparedness, at the high school auditorium. This address will begin at 7:30. Admission to this lecture is free. This will be an unusual opportunity to hear a strong man discuss one of the most vital questions before the people of our country.

At a meeting of the teachers of Hood River county, Friday, January 17, at the high school, resolutions were passed supporting bills now pending before the state legislature, and national legislative assemblies. The following bills, now before the state legislature, which were endorsed by the teachers were the Minimum Wage Act; Vocational Educational Bill, in cooperation with the Smith-Hughes Bill; Reclaiming State School Lands and the Act Providing for the Distribution of State School Funds based upon days' attendance. The Federal Bill, Vocational Educational Bill, including a Secretary of Education as a member of the President's Cabinet, introduced by Senator Hoke Smith, of Georgia, was endorsed.

Evening classes will be resumed this week, meeting on Tuesday and Thursday evenings, 7 to 9 p. m.

The proposed Farmers' Week has been postponed until next fall when it may be held in connection with the exhibition of home project work and the county fair.

School attendance is better now than at any time since the opening of school. General health conditions are good.

FURTHER BOOST FOR LAKE ROAD

Winans City, Oregon,

January 28, 1919.
Editor Glacier: We note with interest in the Hood River Glacier of January 23, 1919, "Nickelsen Boosts Lost Lake Road," and offer important information of record in the matter.

First: A county road was established and built across the land of Mr. Nickelsen, when the land belonged to Mr. Markley. It was upon the petition of D. I. Stone and has been in public use many years. Hood River county having built a substantial bridge over the West Fork of Hood river on this road. The D. I. Stone road had for its initial point the quarter stake on the south line of Section 31, Twp. 1 N. R. 9 E. W. M., located about a half mile northeast of Cedar spring; thence extending in a north-easterly direction connecting with the public highway at Winans city, a distance of about ten miles. Later, on petition of the writer et al, the county court of Hood River county extended the road to the shore of Lost Lake, said extension having for its initial point the meander corner in the east line of Section 16, Twp. 1 S. R. 8 E. W. M., on the western shore of the lake; thence extending in a north-easterly direction about four miles to the southern terminus of the D. I. Stone road, thus making a continuous road to Lost Lake. These roads were surveyed by Murray Kay, then county surveyor, on easy grades. Later Mr. Furrow, engineer, set several miles of grade stakes, making some changes under direction of the county court. Thus it is made plain that the Lost Lake road is a legally established road in fact, and that the pioneer work has already been done. Let all in favor of this road "get in and dig." The writer applied donations made by a few Hood River citizens on opening a short section of the late extension of the road, beginning about a half mile northeast of Cedar springs, avoiding a steep grade and making thereby a substantial and practical start on the opening of the road. The road was opened to the first permanent watering place, an ideal car ground.

Second: The writer, having done considerable promotion work in Hood River and Portland, in the matter of the government road through Lolo Pass, confidently expects the road to be built by the Forest Service in the near future, making a horse shoe loop from Portland via Lolo Pass, Hood River Valley and Columbia River Highway, which will be the greatest mountain road ever cut in the world. The Lost Lake road can be built by July 1, 1919, for the sum appropriated by the Hood River County Court. A road sixteen feet wide with convenient turn out places would be sufficient. Give us a narrow, long road that leads somewhere, in preference to a short, broad road that leads nowhere. It'll not be necessary to destroy large forest trees, thereby avoiding much expense of blasting and removing; they can be passed around and kept for scenic beauty.

We personally appreciate Senator Nickelsen's public spirited reply to the Hood River County Game Protective Association, and welcome that bully booser bunch on the trail.
