The Victory Robin is of the Belmont district is a male instead of a female as was announced by residents of the neighborhood several weeks ago. Residents of the orchard neighborhood believe the bird's mate is sitting, as the gaily plumed fellow is often seen alone at present. Singly and in numbers the Belmont folk have endeavored to trail the freak bird to its nest. The beautiful bird is seen daily by residents of Belmont, and many visitors have been shown the Victory robin.

A coop of 15 carrier pigeons from the coles of W. L. Coates, of Tillamook, were released at 8:30 o'clock Monday by Express Agent Johnson. All but three of the birds within a few seconds after their release ascended about 150 feet above the business section of the city and headed down the Columbia gorge. The three, apparently confused at first, circled for five minutes before taking a westward course.

It is thought that cougars during the past winter have killed a herd of angora goats that ran wild three years ago in the Upper Valley. The animals, straying away from the homestead places of P. J. Mohr and Charles Rawson, fled to the timbered highlands of Mount Hood. Frequently they were seen on the snowfields, and have led to numerous reports by mountain climbers of the discovery of wild goats on Hood. The goats are usually seen in early spring by forest rangers, but no one, although they have been watching for them, has sighted them this season.

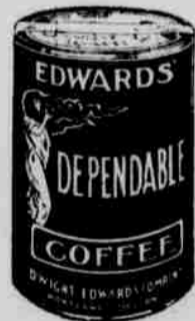

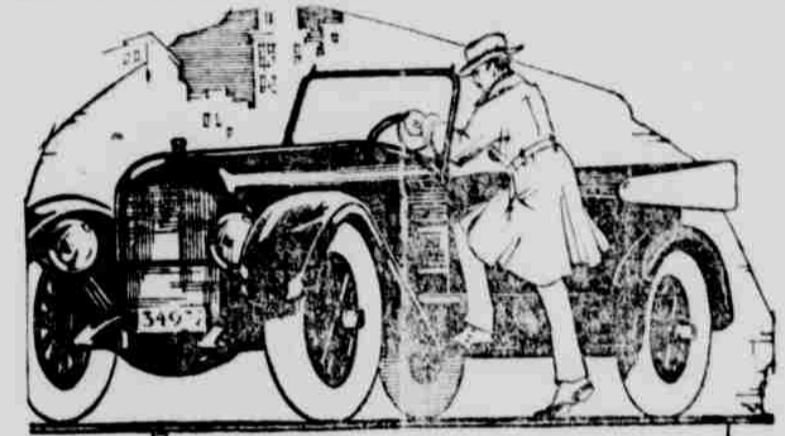
