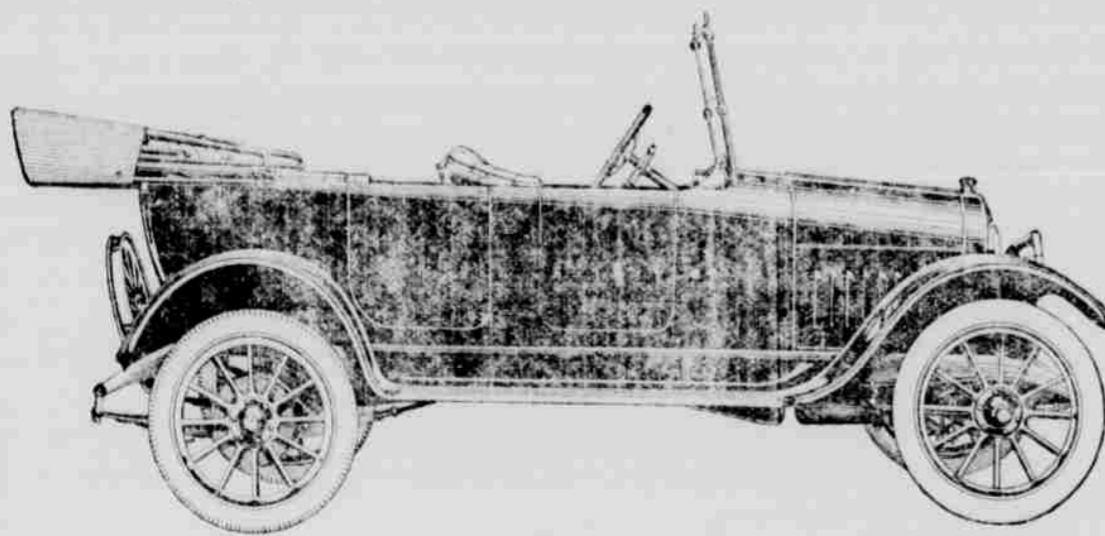

WOMAN'S CLUB NEWS

The final meeting of the Woman's club for the season of 1918-19 was held last Wednesday. Reports were submitted and the new board of directors installed, and at the close of the business session light refreshment were served. A profusion of roses and other spring flowers artistically arranged by Mrs. Wm. Stewart made Library Hall most attractive.

The report of the Club's work for the year past was a most interesting one for this club is now one of the largest and most active in the state, with a membership of 112.

Its work includes many branches and during the past year has been carried on amid serious difficulties, owing to the conditions brought about by the war and the influenza. Much of the success of the club work is due to the faithful and untiring efforts of the retiring president, Mrs. A. G. Lewis, who has missed but one meeting in the two years during which she has held office, and who, with her board of directors, has accomplished much in spite of discouraging circumstances.

The club has had a Red Cross auxiliary which has worked faithfully under the direction of Mrs. S. E. Hartness every week at the Red Cross rooms. Through the philanthropic committee assistance was given to many people during the influenza epidemic. Christmas baskets were distributed and other charitable work carried on.

The five committee stands ready to work with the Commercial club and in any other way possible toward the improvement of the town and valley.

The club has a music department which has given two delightful concerts and with the proceeds from the last one in decorating the walls and adding other much needed improvements to Library Hall. The club during the past year has contributed money toward the soldiers' and sailors' magazine fund, the Roosevelt memorial fund, the Roosevelt memorial fountain in New York, the Boy Scouts of Hood River and the woman's building at the University of Oregon at Eugene, in addition to its yearly contribution to the scholarship loan fund, and through its educational committee has distributed twenty dollars in prizes among the pupils of the high school and grades in Hood River county.

In addition, as individuals the members of the club have been most active in assisting on drives in work for the Liberty loan campaigns and in patriotic service wherever called on.

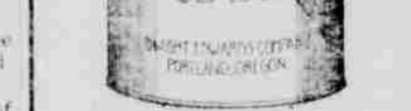

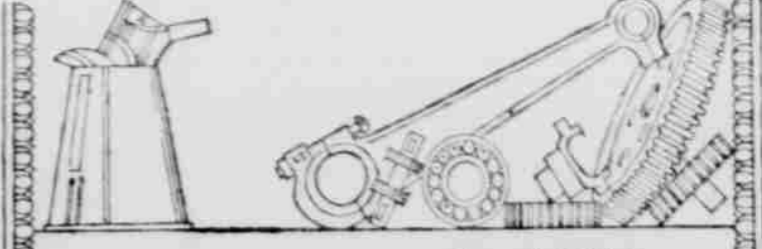
