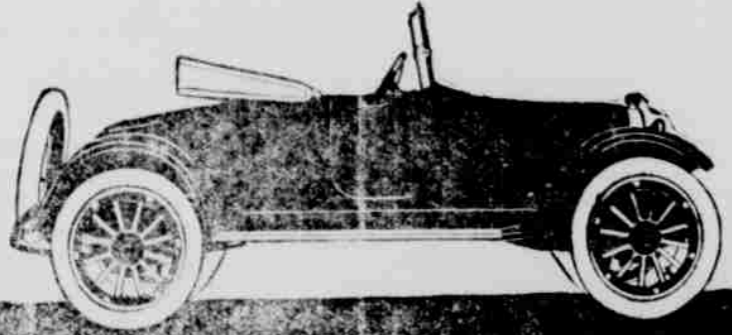

REGENTS FIND THAT STATION IS POPULAR

The Oregon Agricultural College board of regents and Fred W. J. Kerr, here Wednesday of last week on a tour of inspection, found the Hood River branch of the Oregon experiment station probably the most popular institution in the district. Following the instructions of Supt. Childs and Horticultural Brown, who piloted the party through the districts, orchardists have developed trees of perfect health, and the nearing harvest will not only be the biggest but the cleanest.

The experiment station is unique in that the entire 25,000 acres of orchards are at the disposal of experts. Tests are not limited to a small experimental plot, but growers of all communities gladly join the station in checking up results from some trial with fertilizers or spray material. And as a result of the experiment station's activities the regents of the college viewed trees of deep green foliage and branches laden with fruit free from disease pest.

The regents, motoring here over the Highway, were en route to visit an eastern Oregon experimental station and county agents. It will be a triumphal journey for them, if they find all of their protégé institutions as popular as that of Hood River.

Whereas, The State Board of Fish and Game Commissioners is desirous of protecting the trout and other fish inhabiting the waters of Lost Lake Creek, beginning in the northeast quarter (NE 1/4) of Section Sixteen (16), Township one (1), Range eight (8) east, Willamette Meridian; and thence running up Lost Lake Creek in a northeasterly direction for a distance of three-fourths (3/4) mile to the head of said creek; and also beginning at the forks of the north and east tributaries of said Lost Lake Creek and running up the said North Fork to the head of said North Fork, situated in the County of Hood River, State of Oregon;

Therefore, by authority of law vested in the said State Board of Fish and Game Commissioners notice is hereby given that Lost Lake Creek, beginning in the Northeast quarter (NE 1/4) of Section Sixteen (16), Township one (1), Range eight (8) east, Willamette Meridian; and thence running up Lost Lake Creek in a northeasterly direction for a distance of three-fourths (3/4) mile to the head of said creek; and also beginning at the forks of the north and east tributaries of said Lost Lake Creek and running up the said North Fork to the head of said North Fork, situated in the County of Hood River, State of Oregon, are hereby closed to fishing of any kind or in any manner, for trout or other fish, from and after the 1st day of August, 1919, until again reopened by order of the State Board of Fish and Game Commissioners.

MYRTLEWOOD TO BE SEEN AT FRANZ

Hood River people will soon view an exhibition of furniture made from Coos county's famed myrtlewood. J. Mende, who with his wife has arrived here from South Bend for a visit with his daughter, Mrs. Hugh G. Ball, is planning a display of myrtlewood furniture at the Franz store.

Mr. Mende, who now controls practically all of the Coos county myrtle timber, and that means more than half of the world's supply, is the only manufacturer who has ever made a success of working myrtlewood into furniture. The wood, it has been proven, cannot be used in solid form because of the work of worms. Mr. Mende is the only one who has ever been able to produce a cement that will hold myrtlewood veneer. Worms, it is said, do not work the veneered product. Mr. Mende's veneered creation are declared a durable as solid wood.

Mr. Mende, after years as a cabinet maker, retired to ranching near South Bend, and experimented with the beautiful wood during leisure hours from ranch work. As a bride present to his daughter he presented her with a full drawing room set of myrtlewood furniture, including a magnificent piano case.

SMOKING AT DANCES IS UNDER BAN

Geo. W. Stokes, who with Gilbert W. Allen is here from Salem engaged in a fire survey of Hood River, has warned owners of halls used for dances that the state fire marshal's office will prohibit future functions unless promiscuous smoking is prohibited in the buildings. Mr. Stokes and Mr. Allen, while investigating a large hall room Friday found numerous "snipes" along wall railings and moulding and on window sills and banisters.
