HOOD RIVER APPLES GO TO CHURCH

Hood River will ship several thousand boxes of apples that should be even better than the best of former years. The apples will be stored for several weeks in the United Brethren church, for several years without a pastor. Crews of men were busy last week clearing up the floor with heavy timbers and stacking the boxes. Saturday motor trucks delivered their loads of the district's precious Newtowns and Spitzenburgs. Other religious edifices which are without regular pastors, will be used for temporary storage. The shipments of all business houses where space is available are being filled with apples.
