ODELL FOLK EXPRESS DETERMINATION

Residents of the Odell district who held a mass meeting to consider the toll charge of five cents for each call between the Hood River and Odell exchanges, declare their determination not to tolerate the toll charge. The Odell people declare they are willing to stand a flat increase in cost of phone service, but that they disapprove of the toll charge as assessed against them as being discriminatory. The Odell folk, with the grange of the district leading in the protest against the toll charge, have decided to have committees confer with the telephone company. If the company will not discontinue the toll, it is said, and no relief can be had from the Public Service Commission, the residents of the district plan on having their telephones removed.
