

FISH SQUABBLE IS DISCUSSED LOCALLY

Interest in the election and annual neeting of the Houd River County Game Protective Association last might increased through the preceding week as intimations were dropped that the action of the State Fish & Game Commission in ousting State Biologist Finley would be discussed. While memhers of the organization, one of the sirongest leagues of sportsmen in the state, were hesitant in expressing themselves, the general sentiment scenned to fixed Mr. Finley.

Open criticism of Governor Olcott's vaciliations in the matter were made, and sentiment of sportsmen indicated that the proposal of two commissions instead of one to handle game and commercial fishing would be opposed. As resolutions on the matter were in prospect the meeting was well attended. State Game Warden Shoemaker was present.


