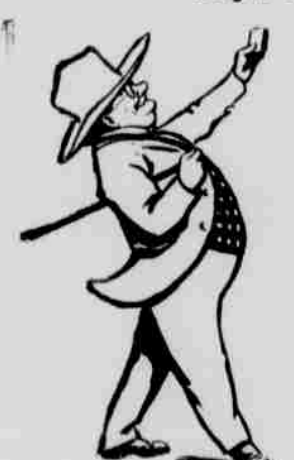

JUDGE WILSON LAYS BLAME ON MOVIES

In an address before the Woman's Club on causes for the delinquencies of boys and the parole system, Circuit Judge Wilson laid the blame largely at the door of moving picture shows and idle moments spent around pool halls. He asserted that the spirit of bravado, the inspiration for many youthful crimes, is often born while boys attend some moving picture show. He commended work of the Y. M. C. A. and Boy Scouts in providing places of recreation to substitute for pool halls. It was suggested that there is room in Hood River for a building where young men may indulge in forms of healthy exercise.

HILLES BUYS MEADOW BROOK FARM

R. E. Scott announced last Friday the sale of Meadowbrook farm, a 60-acre orchard place of the Oak Grove district, by Dr. Joseph McChesney, of Portland, to Mr. and Mrs. John H. Hilles, former residents of Evanston, Ill. The consideration was \$35,000 and the deal is the largest reported here for several years. About 5 acres of the ranch are in cultivation. Thirty acres are set to commercial varieties of apples in full bearing and eight acres are in pears. The remainder of the land in cultivation is devoted to hay and grain. The ranch is equipped with a fine home and other buildings. Dr. McChesney purchased the place from J. W. Palmer several years ago. Dr. McChesney originally planned to establish a sanitarium on the place. Mr. and Mrs. Hilles, who have six young children, have been making semi-annual visits to Hood River for the past three years. Mr. Hilles is owner of extensive properties in Montana. He says he decided on Hood River as a place of residence after exhaustive study of other locations.

CREAMERY'S OUTPUT AT HIGH POINT

The Hood River Creamery, in addition to supplying the local trade entirely, is now shipping record amounts of butter to Portland. The day last week 1,000 pounds of butter were expressed to the metropolis. The day before the shipment reached 500 pounds. Winter cream receipts have never been heavier than at the present time. Practically all fruit growers are now owners of cows.

Peculiar Fog Seen Here

A peculiar phenomenon was witnessed by local residents Wednesday last. A fog, limited to a space about 100 feet over the water's edge was driven down the Columbia gorge by a strong east wind. The white mist had the appearance of the white smoke and steam that is so often seen steaming up behind a speeding locomotive. While the wind blew so strongly from the east on the lower level, a Chinook was apparently hastening from the coast at an altitude of several thousand feet. Fleecy clouds were driven at a rapid rate toward eastern Oregon.

Cleveland Will Be Demonstrated

Interest of orchardists is now centered in tractors, becoming annually more popular in drawing orchard cultivating machinery. H. G. and R. A. Hartshorn, representatives of the Alexander-Buddley Co., of Portland, state distributors for the Cleveland tractor, have arrived here and will spend several weeks demonstrating the Cleveland. The Hood River Garage, local Cleveland dealers, have sold tractors to a number of the owners of larger orchards. J. R. Nunamaker & Sons have just purchased their third Cleveland tractor.

Freeze Damages Nursery Stock

The severest damage suffered by Hood River orchardists from the December cold weather results from killed nursery stock. Two year old pear trees, two year old apple trees, according to Gordon G. Brown, who has made an exhaustive investigation. The deep blanket of snow acted as a protection to nursery stock and trees. Mr. Brown says his investigation has determined that these pear trees were less resistant to frost damage than other varieties.

Bennett Brothers New Name

The name of the Gilbert Motor Car Co., a pioneer institution in handling motor vehicles, power sprayers and farming implements, has been changed to Bennett Brothers. R. B. and L. S. Bennett, formerly publishers of the Hood River News, purchased the concern last fall. The newspaper men left their field in 1918 to enter military service.

Graff Buys Friday Place

A. J. Graff, already owner of large apple and pear interests, has just purchased from Frank P. Friday, through the agency of R. E. Scott, a 15-acre full bearing orchard on the East Side. He paid \$16,000. Mr. Graff and Leroy Childs purchased a 40-acre pear tract near Dee two years ago, and the crop for 1918 returned about 75 per cent of the purchase price.
