RANCHERS SEND FOR TESTS OF SEEDS

Hood River county ranchers have sent in many samples of clover, alfalfa, grass and grain seed to be tested by the farm crops department of O. A. C.

Extension schools on crop rotation and clover, vetch, alfalfa, corn, bean and potato production have been conducted in the county by W. S. Carpenter, of the department. He laid the foundation for the potato growers' organization near Parkdale.

Farmers have been advised as to the adaptability of soils for certain crops. Meadow mixtures and hardy varieties of alfalfa have been recommended. Grain samples are identified and growers told where they can get varieties that they want.

"We test large quantities of seed free of charge, and advise as to the practicability of using certain lots of seed," said G. R. Hyslop, chief in farm crops, when asked what the department did outside of classroom instruction work. "We inspect fields, and grain samples for seed purposes, also inspect fields and harvested potatoes, after they are in the bin, for high class seed of that crop."

LAND CLEARING DEMONSTRATION OFFERED

If ranchers feel that such demonstration will be beneficial, H. D. Sudds, chief of farm management of the Oregon Agricultural College extension work, offers to come here this fall and give a demonstration in clearing logged off land. In a letter to Gordon G. Brown Mr. Sudds states that he has found it economical to use powder and stump pullers for smaller stumps.

For extremely large stumps it is suggested that burners be used.

Mr. Sudds, however, says that stumps cannot be burned unless they have seasoned from three to four years.

WOMAN'S CLUB NEWS

Members of the Hood River Woman's Club will assist in installing the free automobile park being established here. Yesterday members of the Club visited the park and planted rose bushes and lilacs. The club women also propose the beautification of a city park by planting Virginia creepers and other vines around a large open air auditorium.

At the regular session of the club last week an ovation was given Mrs. Chas. H. Castner, ex president of the State Federation as well as the local club, for her work in promoting the recent campaign for school bonds to be used in replacing the old Park street school. Mrs. Castner was also accredited with much of the success of the new Hood River County Public Health Association.

The meeting was one of the most largely attended of the year. Frank A. Cram addressed the women on an initiative bill that is being proposed here for increase of the salary of Supt. Gibson to \$1,800 per year. The club members endorsed the plans, and members have assisted in the circulation of petitions to place the bill on the ballot. Mr. Gibson himself was present and explained the two mill elementary school bill to be voted on May 1.

Miss Hazel Erchinger told of the work now being done by the county library, and Dr. Sifton addressed the women asking their assistance in getting a home for the American Legion Post.

GROWERS PREPARE TO FIGHT PESTS

Investments of orchardists in power spraying machinery indicates a clean crop of apples the coming season. Since January 1 growers have spent \$5,200 on new power sprayers. Many growers owning large holdings have sold sprayers of small power and have purchased equipment operated by higher powered gas engines.

In conjunction with the Apple Growers Association the experiment station has issued a bulletin urging growers to begin the immediate application of miscible oil sprays for the control of aphids, leaf rollers and other sucking pests. The bulletin, issued by Leroy Childs, follows:

"The oil spray is a difficult one to apply owing to the fact that all parts of the tree must be thoroughly covered if good control of the leaf roller is to be obtained. In order to obtain best results there are a few points the growers should continually keep in mind while the spray is being applied. These are:

Apply the spray during warm weather (warm settled weather) as far as it is possible to do so.

The eggs of the leaf roller are deposited on the twigs and branches in all parts of the tree, for the most part on the upper sides of the limbs and twigs. On this account all parts of the trees must be thoroughly covered.

It is important to hit every egg mass. From 25 to 75 worms will hatch from every egg mass, and it is easy to see that a few missed egg masses can result in a very wormy condition of the tree. This is the reason why a great many orchardists report poor leaf roller control.

If poor control occurred in portions of your orchard last year be sure and pick out the most favorable weather conditions this year to spray this section as many more eggs occur on the trees in such sections than where good control was obtained.

After the spray has dried on some of the sprayed trees give them the "once over." If you find unsprayed limbs you can figure that you are doing a poor job. You can also figure that you will have plenty of leaf rollers if you do not do better work.

Growers who have been obtaining excellent control during the past three or four years use the following average amount of diluted oil spray per tree.

Trees 11 years old, 41 gallons; 12 years, 4.5 gallons; 13 years, 5.6 gallons; 14 years, 17 gallons; 15 years, 7.2 gallons; 17 years, 8 gallons.

Check up your average per tree and if you find that you are under these figures it will pay you a big return to increase the amount of spray per tree.

Spray trees immediately. At least 10 days remain during which time the spray should be applied to the apples and probably two weeks."

Funeral services for Mrs. Rebecca Hilderbrand, who died Sunday at the home of her daughter, Mrs. J. A. Walter, were held Monday afternoon at the Anderson chapel, Rev. J. B. Lister officiating. The body was shipped to Wasco for interment. Mrs. Hilderbrand, aged 88 and widow of Michael Hilderbrand, who died 45 years ago, was a native of Illinois. She had resided in Oregon 23 years.

In addition to the local daughter three other daughters and two sons survive. They are: Mrs. C. L. Lofter, of Tygh valley; J. W. Hilderbrand, of Wasco; Douglas Hilderbrand, of Albany; Mrs. Ellen Bailey, of Colabany; and Mrs. Lilly B. Lyons, of West Point, Ill.

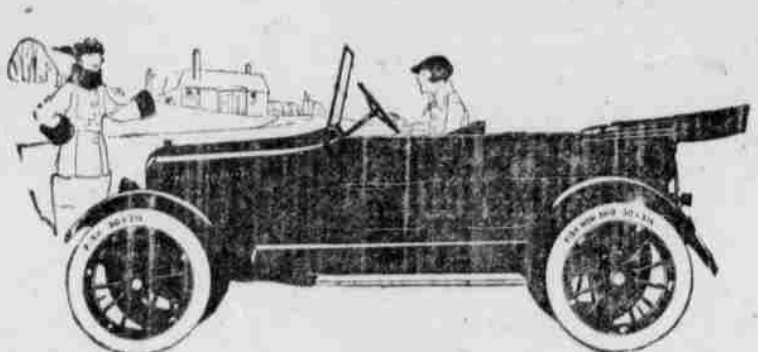
