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STATE FEDERATION URGES CLEAN-UP

In the current issue of the Bulletin, official publication of the Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs, state club women are urged to conduct a campaign for cleaning up ranch and city homes. The women are also urged to study political measures. The Bulletin follows:

Dear Club Workers of Oregon: The General Federation of Women's Clubs has called on its two million members to help in raising the standard of national life by giving attention to Americanization, thrift, community service and citizenship. The work on these subjects has become specialized and their presentation by the club women all over the United States is well worth while. The great slogan of women's clubs everywhere is Education, as applied to all walks of life. The work of rebuilding which is now going on everywhere calls for the club women to reach out to the villages and the rural communities where ever there are groups of women of mutual interests and unity of purpose, trying to work out local problems. The club women should give counsel and encouragement as opportunities come and they need not wait very long for an invitation to be offered. Volunteers in this work would be appreciated as they were in Red Cross and other activities during the war.

With the ratification of the suffrage amendment by at least thirty-one states of the Union, new responsibilities are coming to the club women. They must point the way to higher citizenship by interpreting woman's responsibility to the community, the state and the nation. This is to be done not from a partisan point of view, but from one that is entirely impartial, the subjects being emphasized in relation to proper legislation and its proper enforcement, especially in regard to education, and the welfare of women and children.

May the club women of Oregon meet these responsibilities, and thus do their share in making a stronger nation.

It is the desire of my heart that you may all acquire a knowledge of governmental affairs and exercise your tremendous influence to make better laws, to cooperate and further good citizenship, child welfare, and in general promote and insure justice, equity and happiness for all. Each club should give at least thirty minutes at each meeting to the study of political matters such as party platforms, party organization, international relations, law enforcement, state laws relating to women and children in industry, taxation, public school system, the care and management of our penal, charitable and educational institutions, and any and all questions that come before citizens of either large or small cities and towns, always remembering that principles are greater than parties and issues greater than persons. We must not only vote the ticket proposed by the leaders in the party of our choice, but we must get into the heart of political things, and help make reforms and see that only persons of principle and character are nominated and elected to office. The enforcement of our splendid prohibition law is of vital importance.

In order to free yourselves for the great political work which lies before you, let me beg of you to revise all constitutions that forbid the discussion of politics, for let me assure you that every question worth while is more or less involved in that all-embracing, magnificent word, which savors of God's loving thought and intent as he taught on Sinai the principles of self government. May the Oregon women be the most intelligent of the millions of American women that shall soon be enfranchised.

Finally, sisters, please appoint a chairman of Political Science in your clubs and let me hear from her of your progress.

Civics Committee

At this season there is in the air evidence that the "clean-up" movement is becoming more popular every year. If we as club women are interested in a clean and beautiful state we shall not confine our efforts to our town locality. There are many things that we as federated clubs can accomplish, if each club works to that end. This year especially, we should bear this in mind and see that each town is joining in the clean-up movement. The national convention of Mystic Shriners meets in Portland in June and will bring out not less than 75,000 delegates, and many of these will visit various parts of the state and it behooves us as club women to see that our towns and cities are ready to receive them. Salem, our capital city, is making her plans to have a "spotless city" by painting all her bridges white. The Chamber of Commerce of Portland has adopted the slogan, "A Smokeless Summer," and this would be a fine slogan for every man, woman and child to adopt. What is more disappointing to our tourists, who have heard of beautiful scenery than to come and find it all obscured by smoke.

Another matter the clubs should take up is the billboard nuisance along our highways. Mr. Joseph Penell, in Literary Digest, January 17, 1920, speaks in decided protest against the unsightly billboards and advertising signs straggling across the country, occupying every spot of vantage where pleasant view might otherwise be obtained. Two laws have been passed in England to curb this nuisance. One provides that no billboard may be erected where it will interfere with a view. The other prohibits signs against the skyline.

France has taken the expedient of taxing the signs to death. The rate increases with the size of the billboards. City, state and national laws are necessary. He adds, "I have found that civic associations, particularly those of women, seem to be the only organizations with sufficient courage to tackle the problem. Through their legislation has been obtained in Cincinnati, Memphis and St. Louis are planning similar steps."

On the west side Pacific Highway, leading into Portland overlooking the beautiful Tualatin plains, the view is marred by the unsightly billboard. We suggest that each one of the federated clubs throughout the state take this up and make it a special part of its work.

The State Highway Commission of New York has issued a ruling forbidding the erection of political signs along the highways and state property.

We call attention to the fact that the Oregon State Fair Board has gone on record against fair ground concessions of games of chance and exhibitions of doubtful morality. This should extend to state, county and district fairs and be a means of providing legitimate amusements.

Suggestive questions for civic work for individual clubs in their own locality:

"What does our town need the most?"
"Shall we all keep better lawns and parkings?" "Do we keep our vacant lots free from weeds?" "Is our public camp grounds in good condition?" "Have you a 'flyless city'?"
"What about public bubbling drinking fountains?"

Woman's Social Science Club

The regular work of the Woman's Social Science Club of Silverton for the year 1918-19 was of necessity greatly interfered with by war conditions. Such being the case, we had planned to hold fewer meetings than usual and even some of these had to be omitted on account of the epidemic. However, our interest did not wane and our meetings when held were well attended and interesting. Our club has always been interested in civic improvement and last year saw the appointing of a committee which has been working with a similar committee from the city council for the beautifying of our city park. Our city library also comes in for a share of our attention. It was the direct result of the efforts of our club members and has always been under our care and protection.

Each year we subscribe at least \$10 to the Scholarship Loan Fund. Doubtless the most important item of our last year's work was the raising of \$75.00 for the Armenian Relief Fund drive. The committee having been unable to secure Silverton's quota through the regular channels, solicited the aid of the Woman's club with the above result, which far exceeded the necessary amount.

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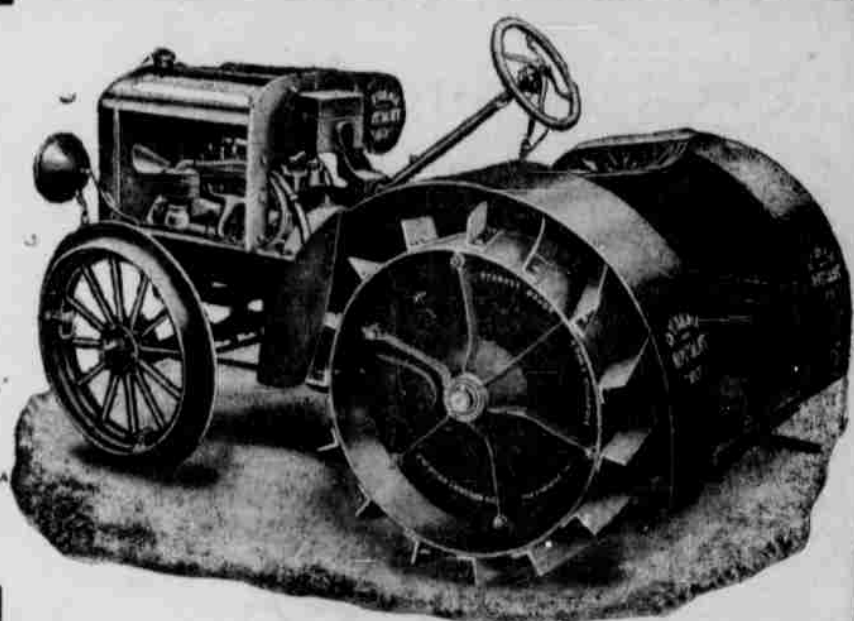
