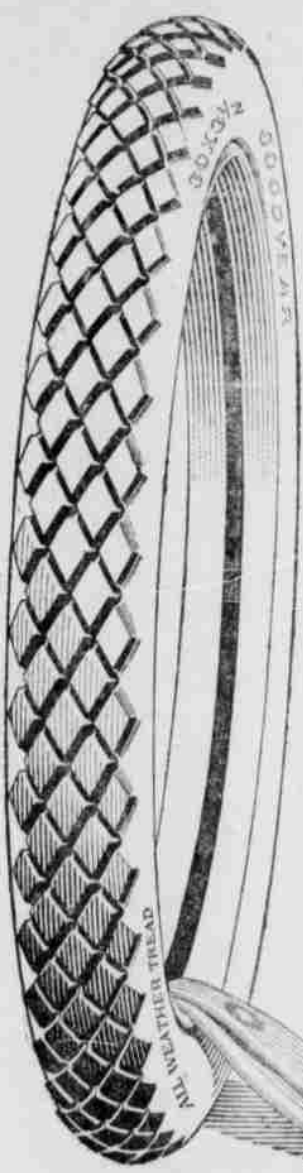

FINDING OF BONES MAY SOLVE MYSTERY

Discovery of portions of a human skeleton near Ruthon hill, the first last week may clear a mystery of years, according to Geo. T. Prange, who believes the bones to be those of Thomas Williams, an early day Vele homesteader of the district. Williams, according to Mr. Prange, disappeared in August, 1881, while with typhoid fever. Search of the countryside was unavailing. The homesteader was known to have had a sum of money and valuable jewelry. The were missed simultaneously with the disappearance of Mr. Williams. The old O. R. & N. line was under construction at the time, and a grove of ill repute had been established near the Williams' cabin. Local residents suspected foul play and robbery by the crew of the resort.

Initiative Petition Signed

Initiative petitions, carrying 827 signatures and calling for a vote on a measure to increase the salary of Supt. of Schools to \$1,800 per annum, have been filed with the county clerk. Notwithstanding the warning at the top of the initiative petition that persons are not voters until they have registered in the precincts in which they reside, C. Shoemaker states that more than 100 unregistered electors have signed the petitions. However, only 376 registered voters, two per cent of the registered voters, are required to sign the petition.

The county clerk has mailed the petitions to Attorney General Brown, at the request that he furnish ballot tickets.

River Shipping Hampered

As a result of the low stage of the Columbia and the heavy bar that has formed above the confluence of the Hood river with the larger stream, shipping by river boats is badly hampered. The inconvenience of present river shipping has prevented the shipment of large quantities of apples by boat. It has become necessary to abandon the customary landing place temporarily, and river steamers call at a sandbar nearly a mile from the city. After delivering a consignment of apples to the both landing last week the Apple Growers Association found that they could not be loaded and the fruit was returned to railroad yards to be shipped by rail.

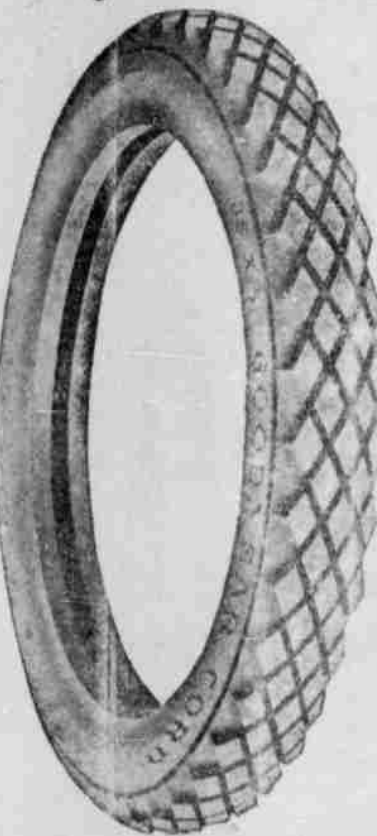

High school graduates will receive \$75 per month.

OUTLOOK ON STRAWBERRIES IS GOOD

While the outlook for cherries, which returned growers a little less than \$30,000 last year, remains indefinite as a result of the cold weather of last December prospects for a good strawberry crop were never better. The berry vines, protected by a blanket of snow from three to four feet deep, escaped injury. Considerable new plantings of the berries were made last year, and it is estimated that the yield of this season will be 15 per cent greater than that of last, when shipments reached 72,000 crates.

The price outlook on strawberries is cheering. Cannons have already visited the district and have made offers of 16 cents per pound, which growers and shippers expect will increase as the harvest season approaches. Some growers have endeavored to buy the entire crop of berries, field run, at 15¢ per crate, but the bulk of the crop, as usual, is stated by shippers, will go forward to Rocky Mountain and north middle western centers packed in standard 24 pint crates. Fruit shipped here last season was sold for an average of nearly \$4 per crate, and the outlook this season seems good.

More than 150 acres of new berry tracts are being set this spring, and the plantings would be doubled if growers could secure plants. These tracts, however, will not begin to bear to any extent until next year.
