Voters are fairly well aroused to the necessity of voting this increased millage. But the ballot at the May primaries will carry another millage bill for educational purposes. A bill that will provide two mills for distribution to the elementary schools of the state.

In another column the purposes of this primary educational bill are fairly well set forth. It behooves Oregon voters to give their children adequate preparation for life. A large percentage of the pupils never attend college. Their ideas of citizenship and moral responsibility are largely formed in the elementary schools. Without sufficient funds the state will necessarily lose its best primary and elementary teachers. But at this formative period of life the children of the state should be provided with the best instructors.

A bill aimed at preventing the deterioration of the elementary schools really deserves a closer attention than the higher educational bill.
