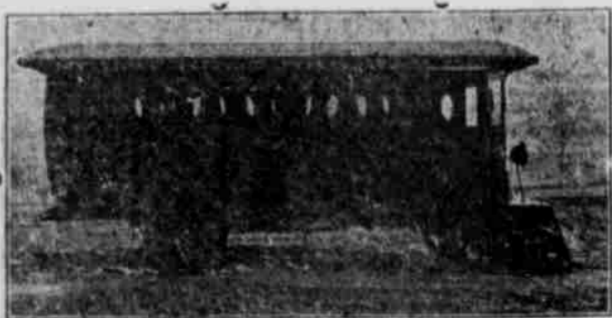

SPRAYED HAY KILLS COWS AND HORSES

Fatal sickness of horses and cows here the past winter will necessitate cessation of use of hay raised in orchards, where it becomes covered with arsenate of lead sprays, according to Dr. M. E. Welch.

Many growers have failed to attribute the illness of the animals to the lead and arsenate poisoning. Indeed, it was thought for a time that the illness was caused from attacks of influenza. Dr. Welch, however, came to the conclusion several months ago that poisoned hay caused the trouble. Because of the great value of the valley's hay crop, however, he hesitated to make public his opinion until it was confirmed by others of his profession.

In the current issue of the American Journal of Veterinary Medicine an article is written by J. W. Kalkus, of Pullman, Wash., who is head of the division of veterinary science at the Washington Agricultural College experiment station, who corroborates the diagnosis made by Dr. Welch. Mr. Kalkus states that the disease developed greatly during the past three years in commercial orchard districts. Many other horses have died while the disease is at the acute stage. None of them fully recover from the chronic disease, and, it is said, are never of value again as work animals.

"In the acute form," says Mr. Kalkus, in his article, "the disease manifests itself suddenly and resembles very much a typical case of respiratory influenza. One veterinarian says: 'All of the cases I have seen first impressed the owner with the idea that his horse had distemper, perhaps because distemper is the most common respiratory disease.'"

"Owing to the economic importance of this orchard horse disease, which is causing serious loss in the state of Washington, a series of experiments is now being conducted at the Washington agricultural experiment station with a view to determining its cause and nature. It is hoped that some definite results may be obtained in the near future."

Dr. Welch has purchased a horse now suffering from a chronic state of the disease and will engage in experiments for the next few weeks.

SOUTHERN OREGON ROADS ARE BAD

"Five dollars up hill and \$3 down, these were the charges made by roadside farmers 16 miles north of Grants Pass for pulling motorists out of the mud," says C. Siegenthaler, former Mount Hood orchardist, who is just back from California, where he spent the winter. "I was glad I was coming home. But at that it was bad enough. The future, however, looks good. For the new Pacific Highway will eliminate the old mud road north of Grants Pass."

Mr. Siegenthaler says he returns home ready to vote for any amount for road improvement here. He declares that any Hood River man who will spend a winter motoring over the good roads of the south will return in the same form of mind. "The roads of the south, too," he says, "have been of great benefit to the farmers. Before they were built many a rancher was between six bits and starvation. Today he is prosperous."

Women Go Motoring

Mrs. J. C. A. Bell and Miss Mae Davidson returned last week from an automobile tour of the Willamette valley. They visited at Brownsville, Lebanon and Albany.

"We just studied farms, hotels and roads," says Mrs. Bell. "The hotels of the Willamette valley seem very progressive to me. We found the roads fair. About 10 miles of the road between Portland and Albany, still unimproved, was pretty muddy, but on the whole the Willamette valley roads are in good condition."
