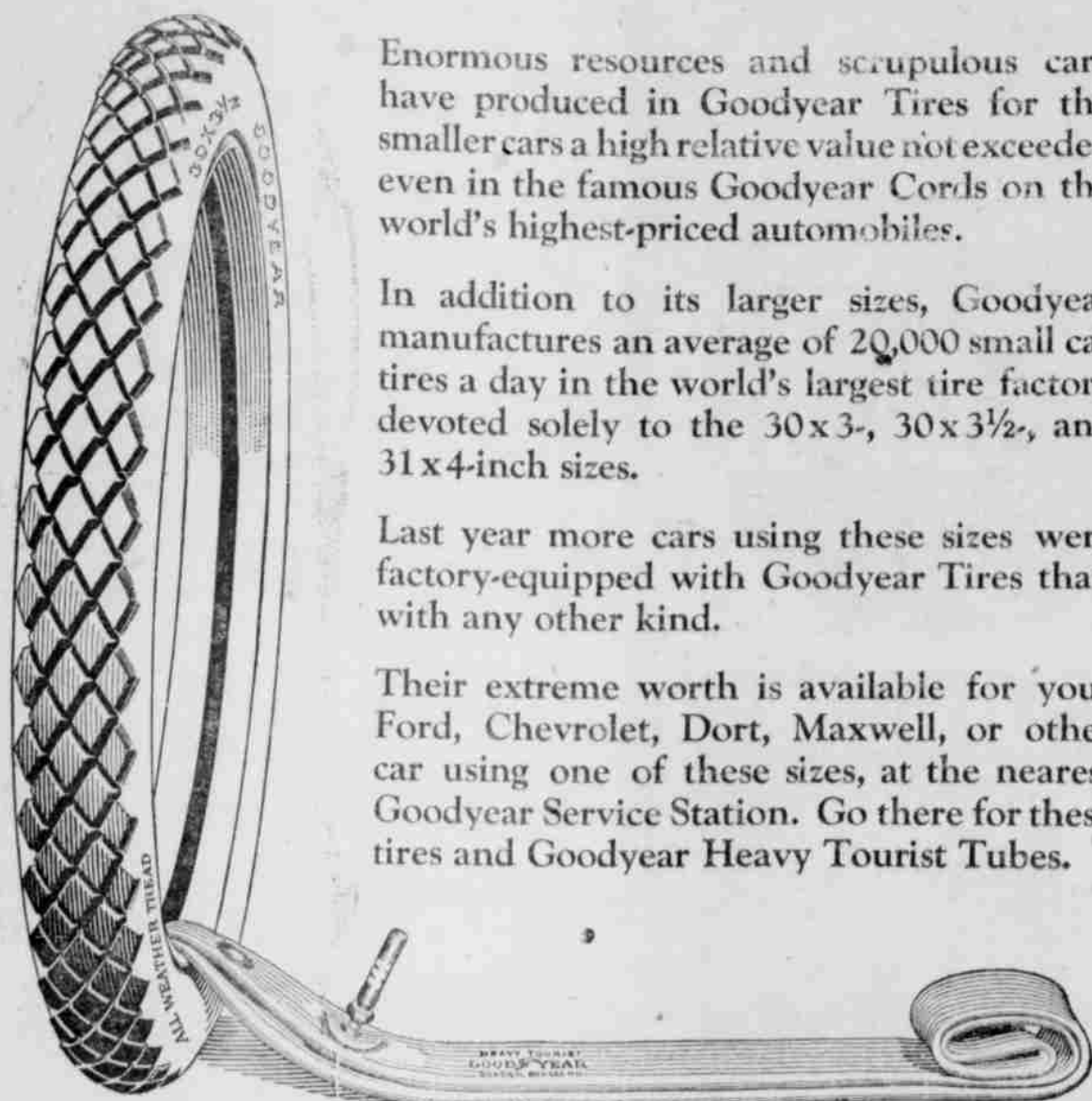

POSTOFFICE SITE REMAINS UNCERTAIN

For a year Hood River has been seeking a new location for a postoffice, the old quarters in the Masonic building where the office has been situated for the past 15 years, according to officials, having grown too small. Last fall a contract was let to C. A. Case for a new structure at the corner of Fourth and street Cascade avenue and immediately a protest was filed by merchants, who claimed the new quarters should be more centrally located. On a withdrawal of the protest Mr. Case claimed that building costs had advanced to such point that he could not construct the building under the terms of the award.

Postoffice Inspector Case, here last week, left the impression that the department would call for new bids for a postoffice home.

Waldie Wins Praise

T. D. Waldie is making a name for himself as a window decorator. During the past week the Perigo store has caused interest by an Olympic flour display. Mr. Waldie converted a bag of the popular brand into a boxer. Another flour bag, labeled "All Other Brands," lies on the floor, having taken the count. The flour bags occupy a real, roped-in platform.

Recently Mr. Waldie decorated a window with Chase & Sanborn coffees. A photograph was sent to the company, and a letter of praise returned. The company stated that the photograph would be used in urging other dealers to make window displays.

State Chamber Asks Funds

P. E. Magruder, representing the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce, was here last week seeking the cooperation of citizens in raising a fund of \$150,000 to be used in advancing Oregon commercial enterprises and of spreading the story of the state's scenic wonders. He stated that the State Chamber proposed to work for the early construction of the proposed skyline highway, which will proceed down the Cascades from the Mount Hood Loop highway to Crater Lake. It was also announced that a portion of the fund would be appropriated for continuing lecture tours of Frank Branch Riley.

Northwest Box Remains

Protests of Northwest apple growers, presented through Representatives Webster and Summers, of Washington, have killed proposed legislation which would have eliminated from further use the present Northwest standard apple box.

The protests, which came in large numbers, were laid before the house committee on coinage, weights and measures about the time the committee was ready to report out a bill substituting the dry bushel measure which would have applied to the Northwest as well as other sections.

Nail Shortage Prevails

An acute box nail shortage is prevailing here at present, and it is likely that a number of growers, planning to make up their season's supply of containers in advance, will be delayed. By June 1, however, the supply of nails will be adequate for the season's crop, one dealer announcing that a shipment of two carloads is expected by that date.

Mal Button Gets Quick Returns

Malcolm Button, whose car was stolen Monday, April 19, on Saturday morning received a check from W. J. Baker, who a short time previously had written him an insurance policy against theft or damages sustained by having the car stolen. The machine was damaged when the thief drove it into a ditch on the West Side. The bill for repairs was paid in full by the insurance company.

Gold Mining to Proceed

Extensive mining development is under way in the Gold Hill district, according to Robert Ferguson, former mining engineer interested in oil development in Oklahoma, who recently purchased an interest in the Gold Beach Mining & Dredging Co. Mr. Ferguson, who was here endeavoring to secure the services of Arthur Lofts in dredging operations, states dredging for gold will be carried on this summer on a large scale.

Vincent & Shank Window Attractive

A window display of Hazelwood condensed milk has won the Vincent & Shank grocery much praise the past week. Numerous ferns and potted plants and an overhead arrangement of spring colored paper streamers added to the attractiveness of the display. The store has a large window, and its displays are always appealing.

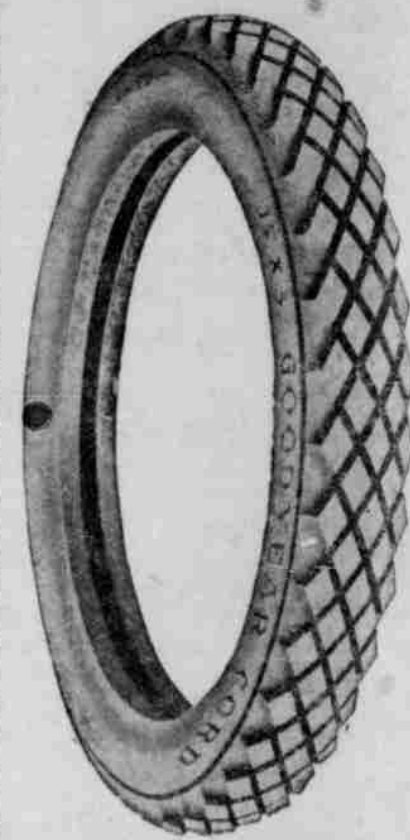

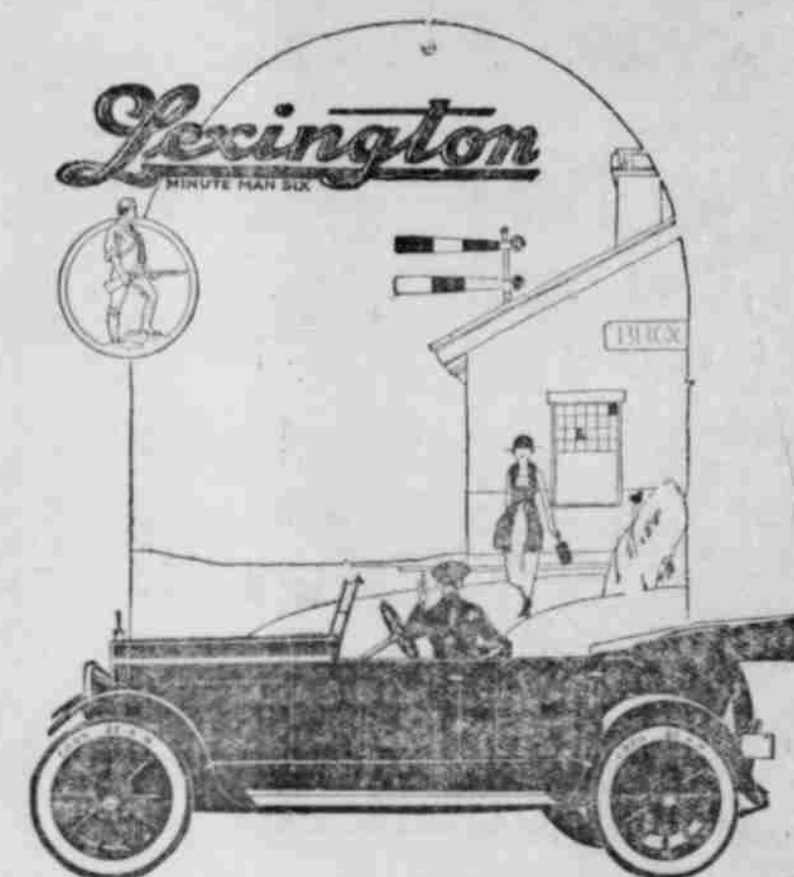
