

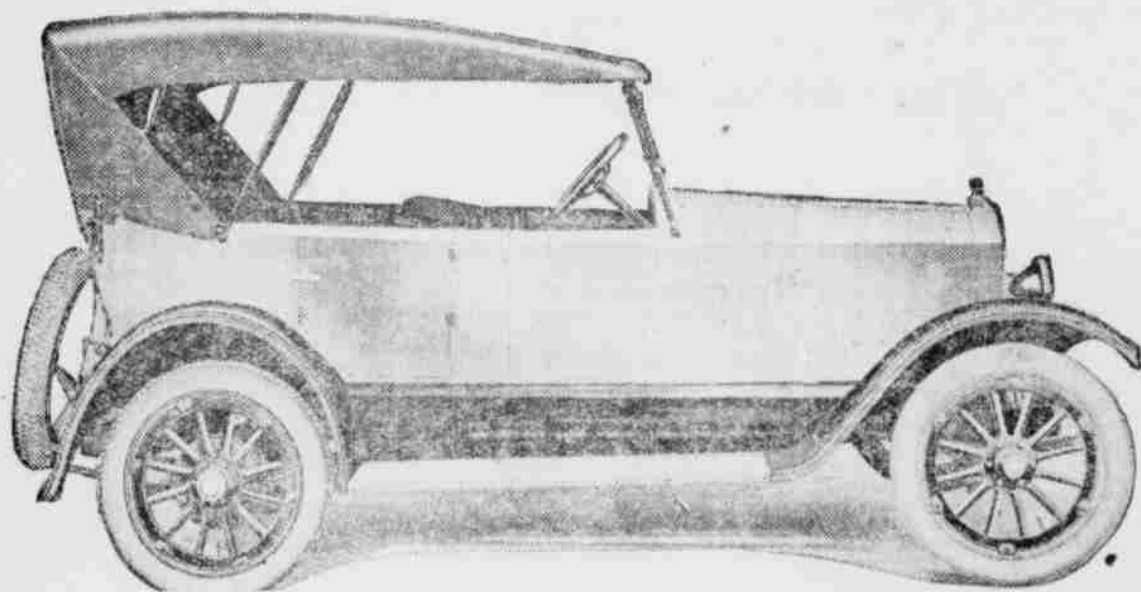

FEDERATION CON- VENTION LOOMS

The annual convention of the Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs will meet in June at Enterprise. The current Bulletin, the Federation's official publication, gives the following on the plans for the convention:

The opening meeting and reception will be held Tuesday evening, June 1, at 8 o'clock.

Delegates leaving from Portland will take the 5:30 o'clock p. m. O.-W. R. & N. train Monday, May 31, which leaves the Union station and arrives at Enterprise at 12:15 p. m. No reduced rates are obtainable.

Representation

Each club of twenty-five members or less included in the Federation shall be entitled to two delegates, one of whom shall be the President or her appointee. Clubs of fifty shall be entitled to three delegates. For each additional fifty members, clubs shall be entitled to one additional delegate. Every City, County or District Federation having ten clubs shall be entitled to two delegates, one of whom shall be the President or her appointee, and one additional delegate for every twenty additional clubs.

Only one Federation shall be recognized in city, county or district. No delegate may represent more than one club or have more than one vote. The delegates, Executive Board, Past Presidents and chairmen of standing committees shall constitute the voting body.

Club Reports

Reports of clubs will be filed with the Recording Secretary.

Committee Reports

Ten minutes will be allowed for the reports of standing committees.

Reports of all clubs and chairmen of committees must be type-written and filed with the Recording Secretary.

Resolutions will be read and acted upon each day. All resolutions must be in the hands of the Resolutions Committee before noon Wednesday.

All officers, delegates or alternates and chairmen of standing committees will be provided with rooms and breakfasts by the hostess clubs.

Convention Program

At the annual convention in Corvallis last October the time of meeting was changed from fall to spring. PRIMARY ELECTION

Educational Measures

Your club is urged to endorse and give its support to the measures appearing on the ballot of the primary election, May 21, and especially those of the millage tax for Higher Education, the two mill tax for elementary schools and the bill for the adult Blind Institution. Club women must rally to the support of these measures to prove their interest in the upbuilding of the educational institutions of the state. Your State President and the Past President, Mrs. Castner, are spending their time in the interest of this work, and ask that the club women give a little time in their respective communities.

Pendleton Current Literature Club

The Current Literature Club of Pendleton has twenty-five members and is primarily a study club, last year studying China, which study is to be completed this year. We adopted a French

orphan and instead of having our usual annual club luncheon gave the money we should have spent as a gift to our ward. We contributed \$10 to the Scholarship Loan Fund and \$5 to the Boys' and Girls' Aid. We helped with all the Liberty Loan and other drives and two of our members gave very valuable aid in the establishment of an emergency hospital during the recent epidemic, and also with a diet kitchen at the same time. Portland Overlook Club

The Overlook Woman's Improvement Club of Portland has a membership of twenty-four. Like all other organizations our plans and program for the first part of last year were badly broken into on account of the ban placed on public meetings during the influenza epidemic. After New Year we tried to make up for lost time and held some very interesting meetings, with some good speakers. We held two open meetings, one in the afternoon and one in the evening, when we entertained the people of the community.

As usual we contributed to the various activities that the clubs are interested in, i. e., overseas hospital fund, Red Cross linen drive, magazine fund for soldiers, Scholarship Loan Fund, Woman's Building at U. of O., etc.

Various members have taken an active part in all the drives, some member of the club taking charge of our precinct in nearly every drive, and on several occasions have helped in other precincts.

We have taken an active part in trying to secure a park and play ground for our district. It has been a long, hard struggle, but we feel that before many months our hopes may be realized. Although we are a small club we feel we have done some good work and have always stood for service to our community, city and nation and have always been foremost in any move for the betterment of our community.

The Portland Woman's Research Club

The Portland Woman's Research Club is one of the new but most active and influential clubs of Portland, organized to train women along practical lines and taking an active part in civic and philanthropic affairs of the city and state.

It is a luncheon club, the aim being to bring before its members at these luncheons the best speakers that can be procured in the city or state and to these programs the best musicians of the city have contributed their services in a generous measure. There is always an average attendance of two hundred or more.

Their war activities did not end with the signing of the armistice, but Red Cross work was continued for several months after; also their work of cooperation with the National League for Women's Service, such as furnishing outtings for the convalescent soldiers and making of garments for overseas aviators.

The club assisted on all the Liberty Loan drives, also purchased a \$100 Victory Bond.

They also assisted on all relief drives having recently helped in the raising of funds for the Albertina Kerr nursery building, and last but not least, the club was the first to pledge \$500 for the woman's building at the University of Oregon, which has been raised and paid.

The program of that date will be in charge of young girls, and the entire program kept as near school life and college spirit as possible. A special feature will be given by the Camp Fire Girls.

At our last regular meeting, \$5 was raised for the Albertina Kerr baby home.

Being the only club of this order in the state, we feel that perhaps our year book will help in a measure other clubs that are desirous of taking up a similar line of study. We also stand ready to assist in any way clubs who wish to take up this line of thought, either for the entire year or one program. Portland Coterie Club

As president of the Coterie Club of Portland, I beg leave to submit an annual report for the term ending June 30, 1919.

This club was organized in May, 1911, and admitted to the State Federation during the same calendar year. The objects of the club are expressed in Article II of its constitution, which reads as follows:

"The object of this club shall be the study of art, literature and science,

with all the current events and questions of the day relating to human welfare, and the promotion of good fellowship and cooperation among women."

Our program during the past year was subject to many changes, owing to existing conditions. Our members planned to devote much of their time sorting spaghnum moss to be used in dressing the wounds of our soldiers, and making scrap books for the hospitals, but just as we were well organized for this work a ban was placed on public gatherings because of an epidemic of Spanish influenza. Then followed the signing of the armistice, and we found it necessary to readjust our work to new conditions. It was then decided to hold our meetings at the University Club, and resume the work for which our club was organized.

Our own members gave talks on many topics of interest appropriate to the times, such as: "Labor after the war," "Some of the problems of peace," discussing indemnities and reconstruction, "Industrial and financial conditions after the war," "America and Europe after the war," "Labor conditions," etc.

One of our programs was given by foreign born pupils of the Failing school. The subject chosen was "What My Country Means to Me."

At another meeting our time was very profitably spent in visiting the Florence Crittenden Home. We found much good was being done for unfortunate girls and babies.

As a means of diversion a farce comedy was given by our own members in a very creditable manner.

Following the suggestion of our State President, our year book was typewritten instead of printed, and the money saved thereby was used to help purchase Liberty Bonds. Our club invested \$100 in bonds and contributed to the Woman's Building Fund.

At the close of the year we had about 25 members.

Biennial Notes

Delegates to the biennial convention will be interested to know that the railroads lately returned to private control have not yet announced new policies governing rates to conventions. Under federal control reduced fares were limited to conventions of religious, fraternal, charitable, military and educational organizations (latter restricted to elementary education only). This policy still prevails, but the G. F. W. C. chairman of transportation, Mrs. Felix J. McWhirter, has high hopes that not later than June 1 a ruling will be made which will secure reduced rates to the Biennial.

Des Moines club women are planning to present a pageant entitled "The Festival of Corn," at the Biennial of the General Federation of Women's Clubs in June. The pageant will be in tableaux, dances and readings of the development of wild prairie into the farms which help to feed the world's people. Iowa legends are to be included in the pageant, which will be printed for use in other communities.

Special City Election Notice

State of Oregon, County of Hood River, City of Hood River, ss.

Notice is hereby given that a special election will be held in the City of Hood River, Hood River County, Oregon, on the 14th day of May, 1920, between the hours of eight o'clock a. m. and seven o'clock p. m., provided that the board may adjourn from twelve o'clock to one o'clock p. m. on said day in the manner as adjournments are taken under the general election laws of the State of Oregon. The polling place for said election shall be at the City Hall in Hood River, Oregon. The judges and clerks of election shall be as follows:

W. J. Baker, John A. Wilson, and Mrs. A. G. Lewis, Judges of Election. Mrs. R. D. Gould and Jessie M. Bishop, Clerks of Election.

Said election is called and held for voting upon the adoption or rejection of certain charter amendments to the charter of the City of Hood River, adopted by the Common Council and referred by the Common Council to the voters of the city. Copies of the proposed amendment can be had at the office of the recorder of said city upon application. The general purpose of said charter amendment is expressed in the ballot title therefor prepared and submitted by the City Attorney of the City of Hood River, as follows:

Referred to the people by the Common Council of the City of Hood River:

An Act to amend the charter of the City of Hood River by adding thereto a new section to be numbered Section 127, authorizing the City Council without further action of the legal voters of the city of Hood River, to issue in the name of and under the corporate seal of the City of Hood River negotiable coupon bonds in an amount not to exceed \$15,000.00 for the purpose of constructing a combined City Hall to be used for city hall purposes and fire department quarters, and for the purpose of furnishing and equipping the same, including the purchase of a fire engine, and providing for the terms and provisions of such bonds and granting powers to the City Council to use the proceeds from the sale thereof for the purposes above mentioned, and giving power to the City Council to levy and collect a tax on all taxable property within the corporate limits of said city, for payment of either interest or principal of the bonds herein authorized, or both, whenever necessary or desirable.

Shall the charter be so amended? 300—Yes.
