

Another Royal Suggestion
GRIDDLE CAKES and WAFFLES

2 cups flour
1/2 teaspoon salt

Buckwheat Cakes
2 cups buckwheat flour
1 cup flour
4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
1/2 cup milk or milk and water
1 tablespoon molasses
1 tablespoon shortening
Sift together flours, baking powder and salt; add liquid, molasses and melted shortening; beat three minutes. Bake on hot greased griddle.

Waffles
2 cups flour
4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup sugar
1 tablespoon melted shortening
Sift flour, baking powder and salt together; add milk to yolks of eggs; mix thoroughly and add to dry ingredients; add melted shortening and mix in beaten whites of eggs. Bake in well greased hot waffle iron until brown. Serve hot with maple syrup. It should take about 1 1/2 minutes to bake each waffle.

SPRAY TALKS

Pears in the lower sections of the valley are in a condition to receive the early application. This is a combination spray used for the control of pear scab, codling moth and the green fruit worm. The spray should be applied as soon as the petals fall in order that best results may be obtained.

Many growers are not familiar with the green fruit worm. This insect causes an injury similar to the leaf miner—often nearly extensive. The worm is light green in color. These worms are not hatched, so that arsenate applied at this time will destroy them before the fruit is damaged.

Atomic sulfur, 12 pounds to 100 gallons, plus arsenate of lead 2 pounds to 100 gallons, should be used upon the Argo variety. On other varieties of pears lime sulfur should be used at the rate of one gallon of the liquid to 40 gallons of water plus the arsenate at the rate of 2 pounds to 100 gallons.
