### WINTER FRESHETS DAMAGE HIGHWAY

Commissioner Hannum, just back from an inspection of the new Lost Lake highway, in a report last week to the Game Protective Association, whose nembers were sponsors for highway work last year, states that winter freshets have caused heavy damage. It will cost \$1,500 to fill washouts, most of which occur on that portion of the road constructed by the forestry ser vice, says Mr. Hannum. He says the forestry service, siming to complete the new road by this fall, is being hampered for lack of men.

"Although they are paying \$5,50 per day and feeding luxuriously," says
Mr. Hannum, "they have but two men
working. The snow is 18 inches deep
yet on the upper end of the route."
