Cookies
 1 cup shortening
 2 cups sugar
 1 cup milk
 2 eggs
 1 teaspoon grated nutmeg
 1 teaspoon vanilla extract or
 1 cup of 1 lemon
 4 cups flour
 1 teaspoon Royal Baking Powder

Cream shortening and sugar together; add milk to beaten eggs and beat again; add slowly to creamed shortening and sugar; add nutmeg and flavoring; add 2 cups flour sifted with baking powder; add enough more flour to make stiff dough. Roll out very thin on floured board; cut with cookie cutter, sprinkle with sugar, or put a raisin or a piece of English walnut in the center of each. Bake about 12 minutes in hot oven.

Cocoa Drop Cakes
 4 tablespoons shortening
 1 cup sugar
 1 egg
 1 cup milk
 1/2 cup cocoa
 1/2 cup flour
 1/2 cup Royal Baking Powder
 1/2 cup vanilla extract

Cream shortening and sugar together; add milk to beaten eggs and beat again; add slowly to creamed shortening and sugar; add cocoa and flour sifted with baking powder; add enough more flour to make stiff dough. Roll out very thin on floured board; cut with cookie cutter, sprinkle with sugar, or put a raisin or a piece of English walnut in the center of each. Bake about 12 minutes in hot oven.

Orange Cakes
 1/2 cup shortening
 1 cup sugar
 1 cup milk
 2 eggs
 1/2 cup flour

When cool cover with orange icing.

WOMAN'S CLUB NEWS

Mrs. Chas. H. Castner, and Mrs. C. O. Huelat just back last Saturday from the Enterprise convention of the Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs, have unstinted praise for the people of Enterprise, who entertained elaborately for the delegation to the eastern Oregon community.

"While it was, comparatively speaking, a small convention in numbers," says Mrs. Castner, "I consider it the most successful ever held in the state. It brought about a better acquaintance between the people of Eastern Oregon and rest of the state that

have a lasting beneficial effect. The action of affiliating with the International and Coast Federation, to be comprised of state organizations of 11 Pacific Coast and International states, will be of vast good.

"Americanization was the main topic of the convention, and the organization took up plans for community service based on work that has been accomplished at Corvallis by club women."

Mrs. Castner recites as a laughable incident of the convention the following: "We had just arrived and were being driven through Enterprise, when we heard a small boy remark: 'Oh, I don't think this a great bunch to make such

a fuss over? Not a one over 16 years old.'"

The trout luncheon at Lake Wallawa, with 1,000 fat trout served, was recounted as a pleasant event.

"We were greeted on arrival with a snowstorm," says Mrs. Castner, "and we left with a thunderstorm cannonading the section. All in between the weather was glorious. Enterprise displayed all kinds of climate for us."

Mrs. William Bell, of Roseburg, second vice president of the federation, stopped off enroute home for a week's visit with Mrs. Castner.

Dr. B. E. Wright, of Portland, has written the Hood River Woman's Club offering to permit the women the use

of land owned by him north of the city along the Columbia front for construction of bathing suits. The Woman's Club will raise funds by public subscription for improvement of the bathing beach.

Strike Light Here

The strike of the linemen's union, which has seriously affected the Pacific Power & Light Co. at some points, has caused but a single man to cease work here. The only union member of local crews was F. L. Green. All other men have remained at work.

UPPER VALLEY POTATO ACREAGE IS LARGER

J. F. Thompson, Upper Valley rancher, says that the Upper Valley potato acreage will be increased about 25 per cent this year. The district shipped 80 carloads of high class tubers last season and several carloads were lost as a result of frost. Mr. Thompson predicts that the 1920 crop will reach 125 carloads.

"We plant Netted Gems and American Wonder chiefly," says Mr. Thompson. The latter variety gives a yield of about 25 bags more to the acre, but a higher percentage of Netted Gems are marketed as first class product.

"At present we are in need of a good rain. Our crop of because of reconstruction work, our irrigation plant was late in starting the delivery of water this year. The hay crop of the district is short. I noticed all the way in to town that hay needs rain."
