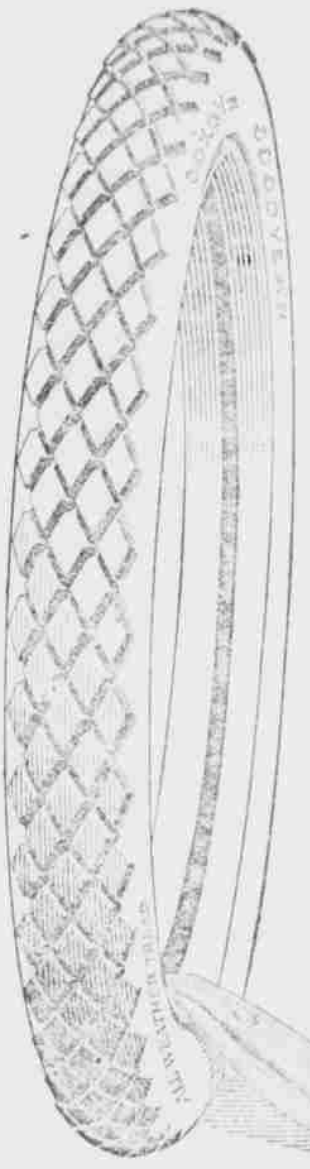

GEORGE SUNDAY IS AMONG SCINTILLANT

George M. Sunday, says a Chicago dispatch, is a chip off the old block. As director of publicity at the Leonard Wood headquarters, young Mr. Sunday has demonstrated the value of his experience in organizing his father's great revivals. He displays the faculty of being able to keep his work going and seeing flocks of callers at the same time. It was marvelous to watch him Saturday as, one after another, he received visitors who came in to publicity headquarters to remark, "And you are Billy Sunday's boy."

To most sons of great fathers who are trying to get along on their own account such a query would be disconcerting, if not offensive. Not so with Billy Sunday's son. He had a line of conversation that soon impressed his visitors that he was not leaning on his famous sire. And he made them all feel good by saying, "You don't need to be in a hurry." It is ascertained that Sunday, Jr., proved his ability as an organizer as a captain of the American expeditionary forces, in which he performed important business service.

NO DIVORCE GRANTED IN LOVELL CASE

Circuit Judge Wilson Saturday declined to award a decree of divorce to either Mrs. Grace M. Lovell, or to her husband, C. E. Lovell, who filed a cross complaint. Both parties alleged cruel and inhuman treatment. Judge Wilson declared that his decision was reached as a result of a letter written from the plaintiff, while in Portland, to her husband, in which she failed to refer to any acts of cruelty and professed a love for her husband. Later last August, Judge Wilson cited the plaintiff returned to live with Mr. Lovell, and he pointed out that all acts of alleged cruelty in both the complaint and cross complaint occurred previously. Judge Wilson ended his decision by appealing to the parties to resume their marital relations.

Mr. Lovell in his cross complaint imputed improper relations on the part of Mrs. Lovell with W. D. Merrill, of Portland. Judge Wilson criticized the defendant for this act and declared that he had heard no testimony from which he could draw any conclusions other than Mrs. Lovell was a good woman.

No local divorce case has created a more widespread attention, members of many Odell families having been summoned as witnesses.

Cows to be Tested for Tuberculosis

There are two big reasons why you should have your cows tested for tuberculosis: first, in order to insure the good health of you and your family, and second, in order to be a good law-abiding citizen.

Oregon has a law requiring that all persons selling milk or cream must have their cows tested for tuberculosis. Dr. C. M. Gardner, Deputy State Veterinarian will be in the Valley next week, beginning Monday, June 14th, to test cows. There will be no charge for services. All people living on the Heights are requested to take their cows to the Auto shed on the High School grounds Tuesday morning. All people down in the lower part of town having just one or two cows are requested to take their cows to the hitching rail across from the Feed Yard on Tuesday forenoon.

Applications for tuberculosis tests should be made to Prof. R. V. Wright, Phone 2782, high school, 2391, or write: Remember, the services are free and you are required by law to have your cows tested if you sell milk or cream.

Lost Lake Work Progresses

Commissioner Hannum, who was here last week from the district, where he has charge of construction work, to attend a session of county court, reported that work on both county and forestry crews is progressing on the new Lost Lake Highway. Mr. Hannum has seven men engaged in improving a stretch of old roads in the Sandy Flat section. The forestry crews are engaged in cutting three miles of new road through the national forest into the lake. He says the forestry service expects to have the new grade ready for automobile traffic by this fall.

A bargain hunter would have met with a prize last week, according to neighbors, if he had happened in at the home of Geo. Galloway, prominent Frankfort orchardist. Mr. Galloway offered a purchased Jersey cow for 50 cents. He had just purchased the animal, but because of a sore under he had more trials than Job in milking her.
