Crackers Cause Fire
One fire has already been caused by premature explosion by children of fire crackers brought here by merchants for Fourth of July. A tool house near the city reservoir called out the fire department Sunday. Marshal Frazier says that scores of youngsters are buying firecrackers and shooting them promiscuously. Underwood Apple Crop Short
A. J. Haynes, owner of one of the largest orchard tracts in the Underwood district, here last week, states that no fruit trees of the section are showing any permanent injury from the December cold weather except peaches. Many peach trees, he says, were killed.

"We will have about 40 per cent of the apples harvested last year," says Mr. Haynes. "We had a very heavy yield last season. Our June drop this year has been very heavy."
