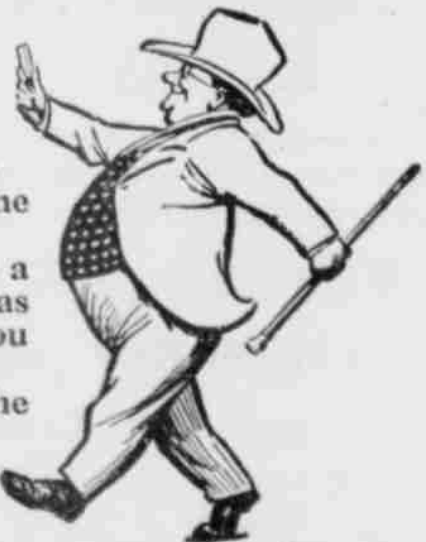

CASCADE'S PHONE SERVICE IS A NEED

Local city and county officials characterize the present nighttime lack of communication between Hood River and Cascade Locks as a criminal negligence. Between early evening hours and early morning hours Cascade Locks, officials declare, is completely isolated. The telephone exchange operated at Cascade Locks by the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Co., although in a private residence, declines to make nighttime connections, and the telegraph office there closes after the passing of early evening passenger trains.

"We badly need some means of communicating with the Locks," says Marshal Frazier. "If the two white boys and negroes, captured here and held as witnesses on the Mayes murder case, had proceeded west, as they had intended, we could only have saved Cascade Locks by sending an automobile there. We are petitioning the phone companies to give us a night service."

THE HOTTEST JAG EVER REPORTED HERE

"Hot belly! Hot belly!" Thus moaned a Siwash buck, as he stroked his stomach, at a prominent Hood River business intersection last week. The city lacked police officials, all officers having gone in pursuit of the alleged negro murderer of O. W. R. & N. Brakeman Otis Mayes. The Indian's moments of pain, however, at intervals seemed to change to pure joy and he would laugh merrily and clap his hands. On one occasion he tried to do a war dance and let out a deafening whoop. Finally fellow braves loaded him into an automobile and drove away. The Redman's condition was finally explained by an empty can of "Sterno," a preparation of alcohol, pressed into cubes. The Indian, it was explained by others of the tribe, had made a potent cocktail by melting the heat cubes in water. TIRE SERVICE STATION NEW TIRE CONCERN

Al Whitehead, until recently engaged for the railway administration in inspection of apples being shipped out, has opened a new vulcanizing and tire repair shop on Oak street. The new place will be called "Tire Service Station." Floyd French is associated with Mr. Whitehead in the new business. Later a full line of tires and automobile accessories will be added. The new concern occupies the structure formerly used by Howell Bros. on Oak street. The building has been neatly painted and large new windows have been placed in the front.

Year's Fire Loss is \$17,120

An annual report of the State Fire Marshal, covering the year ending March 30, 1920, gives Hood River's county's total fire loss for the year, as shown by insurance paid, at \$17,120. Thirty-seven outbreaks of fire were reported in property on which an aggregate insurance of \$716,501 was carried. Overheated and defective chimneys caused seven of the fires. Rubbish and sparks are listed as having caused 16.

Flood Crest Passed

The Columbia is now practically at a standstill. River men think the river, which reached a 23-foot stage, has passed the crest of the flood. It is expected, however, according to Leonard Miller, agent of the Northwestern Transportation Co., that the river will remain fairly stationary for the next two weeks.

Moreland Place Sold

P. B. Peterson, of Eugene, has just sold the J. C. Moreland ranch, west of the city, to H. B. Johnson, a Portland man. The property comprises 42 acres, of which 20 are in bearing orchard. Mr. Johnson will come here to make his home.

Ostergaard Markets Potatoes

First local new potatoes for the season were brought to town Tuesday by M. Ostergaard, of Viento. The tubers, as large as product shipped in from California, is retailed for 15 cents per pound.

Spencers Buy Hogue Place

J. D. Spencer, of Portland, has purchased from R. R. Hogue and wife two Oak Grove tracts aggregating 101 acres. The Spencer family will spend the summers here on the place, a part of which is set to orchard.

First Raspberries Marketed

The first red raspberries of the season appeared on the local market Wednesday of last week, retailing for 30 cents per pint hallock, a record price for the fruit. The berries were grown by Howard Hollenbeck, of the Frankton district.

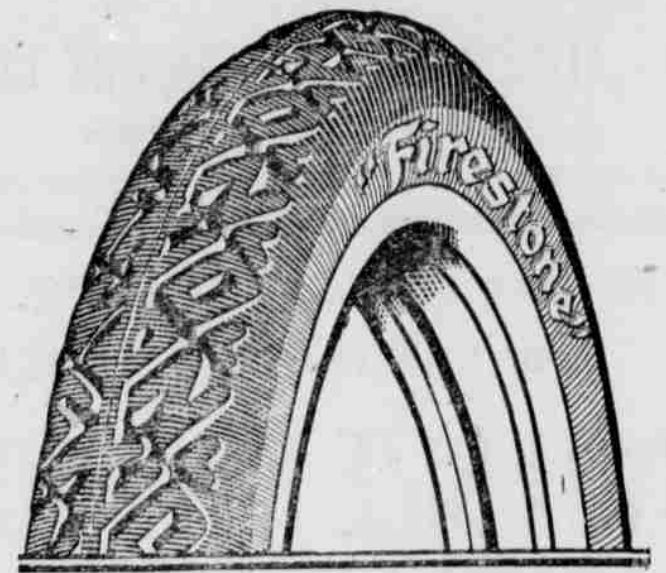

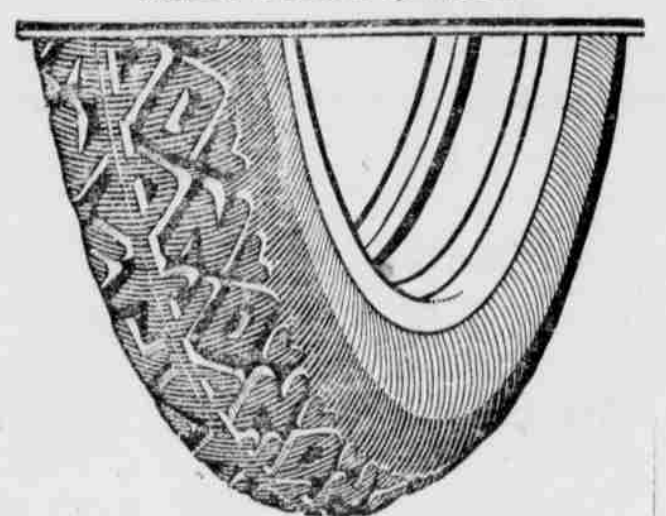
