CHERRY HARVEST IS NOW UNDER WAY

The Hood River cherry crop will be harvested fairly completely in the next two weeks, according to present indications. The warm weather of the past few days has caused the fruit to ripen rapidly. The Association has sold the Royal Anns of its members to canners, although the price has not been announced. The Association will ship black varieties under refrigeration to eastern points. L. E. Ireland is offering 124 cents per pound straight for all varieties.

Old Place Grows, Says Visitor
