The so-called independent gasoline will cost about 42 cents per gallon, materially in excess of the charge that is being made by the Standard Oil Co. How much Gas across Continent
To determine for the automobile industry and the motor buying public the comparative merits of the light-weight car as regards its stamina and economy in a continued run of 3000 miles with a relay of 25 drivers at the wheel, a transcontinental economy run will be started from New York at midnight, Sunday, July 18.

EARLY APPLE PROSPECTS ARE BRIGHT

John Sheridan, of Sheridan-Beckley Co., Portland, who Tuesday made the season's first purchase of apples, having taken the Astorian crop of W. H. Furrow predicts that Portland will take all the Northwest's early crop at record prices. He says:

"We have no peaches except the exorbitantly high article shipped up from California. Berries are exceptionally high, and cherries are about off the market. Early apples will be in good demand for cooking, despite high priced sugar and growers who are packing attractive packages of early varieties for stand sales will reap a fortune."

Joe Sunseri, accompanied Mr. Sheridan here. He will remain to look after shipments. Mr. Sheridan advises that the earlier varieties be shipped 25 per cent green.

SPRAY TRACTOR DEMONSTRATED FRIDAY

A combination tractor-sprayer, demonstrated here Friday afternoon on the old Shepard ranch by the DeWitt garage, created a widespread interest among orchardists. The tractor both draws the sprayer equipment through the orchard and drives the pump. The pumping apparatus is attached to the front of the tractor. By use of the high-powered tractor engine, the sprayer can be operated at high pressure.

Horticultural experts are urging the growers to use more power in their spraying operations, thus securing a finer breaking up of the spray particles. It is said that the sprays, more evenly distributed, are much more effective when applied with great power.

The new outfit meets with approval of growers because it is much more powerful than the old horse-drawn outfit. It can pass under branches without obstruction. It can also be turned in a minimum of space. The tractor can be quickly disconnected from the spraying apparatus and used for other purposes. The tractor is a Fordson, and the spray machinery used is manufactured by the Bean Spray Pump Co. Both makes of machines are already well established and popular here.

Duckwall Announces Newtown Price
Duckwall Bros., who are developing an apple marketing concern in addition to their business as grocers, have announced an average net price of \$1.75 to growers on Newtowns purchased from last year's crop. The partners declare that the blocking of export business by control price last fall hurt Newtown sales. The men called for their export sizes first, and then were unable to ship any of the fruit to England.

"We will handle apples for export this year, however," says John C. Duckwall, in addition to our domestic sales. Last year our Newtown tonnage reached about 18 cars only."

Washington Road Inspected
Hood River county, now building a stretch of concrete road in the Odell section, will follow to a large degree plans of construction pursued in Clarke county, Wash., where a concrete road is being laid between Camas and Vancouver. Commissioner Vanhook, who has charge of securing machinery and materials for the local road, under construction on force account, with C. B. Hatch appointed as superintendent, visited the Camas-Vancouver road yesterday, declaring himself well pleased with it. The local road, however, will be a few feet narrower than the Washington county highway.

Sheep Wandering Again
Orchardists of neighborhoods bordering the forest ranges have begun their annual complaint against marauding of stray sheep. Animals, wandering from herds last year, caused considerable loss among orchardists, the sheep evidencing a fondness for apple bark.

R. W. Sparks, Oak Grove rancher, reports that a ewe and three lambs have selected his orchard for foraging. He is seeking herders. Unless he is given early relief, he declares, he will eat them.
