LAST SATURDAY**

Funeral services for Everett Lafferty, who died in San Francisco Wednesday of last week, were held at the Asbury Methodist church Saturday. Mr. Lafferty contracted dysentery while at Peralta, P. I., settling the estate of a brother, J. V. Lafferty, a gold miner. His condition became serious while the steamship bringing him home was several days out from San Francisco. A wireless message informed his brother, L. U. Lafferty, of this city, and his mother, Mrs. Geo. W. Lafferty, and a brother, J. B. Lafferty, of Weiser, Ida. The Idaho relatives hurried to San Francisco. The local Knights of Pythias lodge, of which Mr. Lafferty was a member, notified the Pythian Relief Committee at San Francisco, and Knights there met Mr. Lafferty and escorted him to a hospital. The funeral service was conducted by Rev. D. M. Helmick. Interment followed at Idelwild cemetery, where the Knights of Pythias ritualistic service was observed.

Thirty-six Portland hotelmen and members of their families motored here Wednesday of last week, and were the guests of W. Ross Winans, pioneer of the Dee section. Mr. Winans made elaborate preparations, and the visitors were served a sumptuous lunch on rustic tables beneath the shade of a grove near the Devil's Punch Bowl.

Mr. Winans, known as the mid-Columbia's most prolific poet, presented each guest with autographed songs and poems. On Wednesday evening the hotel people were entertained here by Mr. and Mrs. F. W. Chindland. Harry T. DeWitt was pacemaker for the party on arrival in the valley last week.

DISTINGUISHED SOLDIER VISITS SISTER

Col. Lucius R. Holbrook, who gave the order for America's first artillery shot fired against Germany, was here last week for a visit with the family of his sister, Mrs. Geo. M. Gallaway. Col. Holbrook, now stationed at Fort Leavenworth, Kas., left Sunday for the north. He is spending a short time on the Pacific coast. Col. Holbrook was stationed on the Mexican border with a cavalry regiment when America declared war. His regiment, transferred to field artillery service, was one of the first contingents sent abroad.

**JUNE BUTTER RECORD
BEST IN HISTORY**

Although he expected to show a slight decline over May, W. H. Black says his record for butter production for June is far in excess of any former month in the history of the creamery. The creamery last month made 15,000 pounds of butter. The production for May reached 12,000 pounds. In addition to the butter output the creamery furnishes the town with sweet cream. The creamery when Mr. Black took charge three years ago, was making only 4,000 pounds of butter monthly.

Oregon Lumber Co. Gives Rock

The Oregon Lumber Co. has presented Hood River county with a free four-year lease of a quarry located near the concern's plant at Dee. The county officials, after examining the rock and finding it excellent quality, have established a crusher at the point. The quarry is on a narrow road and because of its accessibility, material can be distributed at a minimum of cost.

Frederick Gets King's Discharge

Milo S. Frederick, who served in France and Italy as a gunner with the Royal Field Artillery, last week received a king's discharge. "The discharge, dated March 19, is signed by 'George, R. I.' It certifies that Mr. Frederick served with honor and was disabled in the Great War. Mr. Frederick, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. J. Frederick, returned home last spring accompanied by a British bride. He received a wound in the leg while serving in the Pieve campaign.

Ranley Wants City Quarters

One of the old residences being razed for the new city hall, up to the time the wreckers began work, was occupied by Chris Ranley, who thinks the city should provide him with a new cozier's shop. Unable to find quarters, he has visited City Recorder Howe and has argued that Mr. Howe should set aside a corner of his office for Mr. Ranley's hats, hammers, awls and other paraphernalia.

Thunderstorm Hits Valley

A typical down East thunderstorm, accompanied by a heavy shower, prevailed over the mid-Columbia Friday afternoon. Lightning fired a tree on the Highway between here and Mosier, and another just opposite here on the heights above White Salmon. The rain soon extinguished the fires. The rainfall was heavier in the Parkdale district than on lower levels. Laying the dust it benefited roads.

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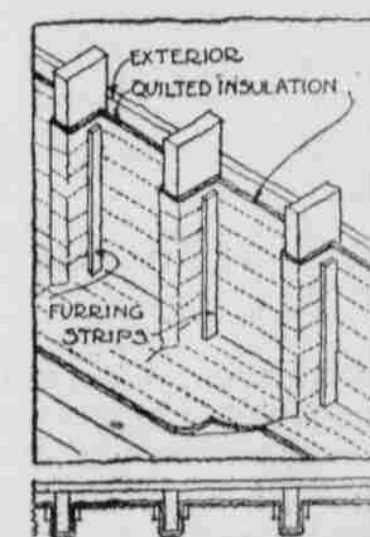
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
