PREFERS INDEPENDENCE TO HIGH POSITION

The Democratic party of the Philippines will join the Nationalista party, which is now in power, in the demand for immediate independence of the Philippines, Senator Teodoro Sandico, only member of the Democratic party in the Philippine senate, said in an address at a luncheon at Manila, This

The luncheon was given for members of both houses of the Philippine legislature by former Senator Gabaldon, recently chosen resident commissioner at Washington.

Sergio Osmena, speaker of the Philippine house of representatives and head of the dominant Nationalista party, who was recently termed "the greatest Filipino since Rizal," addressing Senator Gabaldon, said:

"We urge upon you in your capacity of resident commissioner to the United States to tell Congress and the people of that noble country that we who are gathered here today would prefer to be the poorest and humblest citizens of the Philippines with independence in our hands than the leaders that we now are in our country under the tutelage of another country."
