TIL D. TAYLOR WAS KILLED SUNDAY

No Oregon murder has so aroused Hood River as that of Sheriff Til Taylor, of Umatilla county, news of whose killing by jail breakers Sunday spread here with delivery of the Oregonian Monday morning. Mr. Taylor was personally known to scores of former eastern Oregon residents. E. O. Blanchard and W. H. Taft were members of the party of Al Kader Temple Shriners who visited La Grande last September to initiate a class of novices of which Mr. Taylor was a member.

"Til Taylor was one of the Pacific coast's most fearless officers," declared Sheriff Johnson. "We will miss the example he set as an efficient officer."

Sheriff Taylor was a nephew of B. F. Gerking. Two cousins Mrs. E. H. Dreske and Hubbard Taylor, reside here. He was one of the best known sheriffs in the state, having participated in the capture of many bad men, not only in eastern Oregon, but in other sections. He was one of the chief men in capturing the murderers of Claremont Tavern last winter.

Forest Fire Subsiding

A forest fire, the smoke of which has been alarming Hood River people the past several days, has been definitely located on the headwaters of Wind river. The fire was at first thought to have started in the Little White Salmon valley and local citizens interested in a new sawmill in the district were alarmed. The smoke is now subsiding, and reports are to the effect that the fire is under control.
