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A NEW ERA OF PROGRESS

With the announcement that a new tourist hotel will be erected at Wau-Guin-Guin we may confidently expect the beginning of a new era in the Hood River Valley, the heart of the mid-Columbia. While the apple had brought the district fame even before the Columbia Highway had been projected, the great scenic highway has aided in spreading the name of the Cascades and the Valley of Apples, the Valley of Peace, guarded by two sentinel mountains. Eight years ago we were fairly prosperous here. We had hewn out the virgin forests and were harvesting apples from mature trees. But we were still rather provincial, or sectional, if you will. We didn't mix with the outside world. Indeed it was a more difficult task than today. We greeted guests comparatively infrequently. Then came the great water grade highway up the south side of the mighty gorge. Visitors began to come by the thousands. With the opening of the road, an era of garage business began here. The profits from a tourist business as well as that of home folk attracted energetic men. Perhaps in no town of the northwest has such a step forward in the automobile business been evidenced during the past five years as in Hood River.

But we must be prepared not merely to look after the automobiles of our visitors, who have heard of our scenery and who have been invited to come and enjoy it; we must provide comforts for the residents themselves. Southern California learned the necessity of good tourist hotels many years ago. Southern California's scenery cannot be compared with that of Oregon, but if we cash in on our highway investments we must spend some more money in preparations for the tourists who are to furnish the dividends.

The jailbreakers of Pendleton, one of whom murdered Sheriff Til D. Taylor, have been captured after a week of pursuit. They are again behind the bars awaiting the demands of justice. The law has restored the noose, and a new gibbet is being prepared at Salem. For a time threats of lynching were heard on all sides in Pendleton, and mobs all but formed. The appeal of W. R. Taylor, brother of the beloved dead sheriff, dispersed those bent on illegal violence. He invoked the name of his brother and called for law enforcement. With few exceptions the folk of Umatilla county are law-abiding. The uprightness of the murdered sheriff has left its deep impress.

An incident at the completion of the Highway paving Monday afternoon evidenced that H. W. Mitchell, prominent automobile dealer, places business above chivalry. It was scheduled that Mrs. William Collins, wife of the paving superintendent, drive over the newly finished paving first, but it appeared that Mr. Mitchell had prepared with an early jockey for a start and had already secured a promise of first place from a high official of the paving company. Women have the privilege of the ballot in Oregon now, and Mrs. Collins gracefully withdrew in behalf of Mr. Mitchell.

The Socialist party and the Non-Partisan League are on an equal footing in one respect. Debs is in prison. A. C. Townley, the big leader of the Non-Partisan League, has been denied a new trial on charge of conspiracy to encourage disloyalty during the war. He is under 90-day jail sentence.

Says the Fruit Trade Journal: "At least one cause of congratulation still remains. All signs point to a crop of apples of unusually fine quality in Hood River this year."

Legion Man Opposes Japanese

Absolute exclusion of Japanese and permanent disarmament of children of Japanese from American citizenship were urged by Major Bert C. Ross, of Seattle, before the hearing of the house immigration committee at Tacoma Monday afternoon.

Maj. Ross said he spoke as a representative of the Anti-Japanese League and as a member of the veterans of foreign wars, the American Legion and the national committee of the Legion dealing with the subject of Asiatic immigration. He read a statement charging that hundreds of Japanese entered this country on passports in violation of the American-Japanese agreement, and that an "emotional campaign" is being financed by the Japanese interests in the east favorable to Japanese naturalization.

Representative Johnson C. Cox, of Texas, left during the afternoon session for his home in Texas. On the eve of his departure he declared that congress could no longer ignore the Japanese question and that it must be considered from its economic standpoint at the next session.

Roberts Buys Guernseys

C. T. Roberts has returned from the Willamette valley with two registered Guernsey cows. Mr. Roberts, who has owned a Guernsey bull for several years, will dispose of his grade cows and will devote his entire attention to production of blooded Guernseys.

CASCADE COUPLE RAISES DISTURBANCE

Mr. and Mrs. G. F. Moyer, Cascade Locks couple, who kept that town agog Tuesday, according to the story told by officials, were brought here Tuesday afternoon and bound over by Justice of the Peace Onthank to action of the grand jury under \$300 bonds to keep the peace. The two were charged with a threat to kill Constable E. S. Olinger, who Monday visited Cascade Locks to foreclose a mortgage on personal property given last year when C. D. Nickelsen went the bond of the husband, accused of threatening Postmaster Henderson. Mrs. Moyer, it was alleged, drew a revolver on Constable Olinger, who declares he withdrew, having been convinced that she was determined. Sheriff Johnson accompanied Mr. Olinger and Mr. Nickelsen to the Locks. He says:

"Mr. Nickelsen proceeded to search for some goats, a part of the personality included in the mortgage. He had found one of them and was ready to untie its tether when the man and wife appeared out of the brush using abusive language. Mr. Nickelsen drew his gun and the man and woman approached as he backed off. He fired over their heads and then tripped backward over a root. The man untied the goat's halter and the animal fled into the brush.

Later Mr. and Mrs. Moyer made a full settlement with Mr. Nickelsen, but the woman flew into a rage when the warrant charging the attempt to kill was produced. She tore the document to small bits. She created a sensation here in the justice court when she fainted and it was necessary to remove her to the Commercial club rooms to revive her.

HANNUM ROUTE IS FINALLY SELECTED

County Commissioner Hannum and other citizens expressed gratification yesterday on learning that the United States Forestry Service had agreed to accept a location for the highway connecting county roads with the national forest in the Upper Valley and a link of the Mount Hood Loop Highway different from that of a recent survey made by the State Highway Commission. Mr. Hannum, who has maintained since the state survey was completed that another route would be some \$45,000 cheaper, accompanied C. H. Purcell, federal road engineer, over the proposed substitute route last week. Mr. Hannum thinks a good road may be built over the route he suggests, connecting existing roads with the national forest, where the forestry service has let a contract for seven miles of grading on the Mount Hood Loop Highway, for \$5,000.

JACK BROWN IS IN HERO ROLE

Jack Brown, truck driver for the Kibbe Construction Co., played the role of hero Sunday when he ditched his big truck at the foot of Ruthion hill grade to avoid striking automobiles loaded with tourists. As Mr. Brown turned a sharp curve he saw that he would run head on into two cars racing abreast around the point. He whirled his steering gear and went over the bank. While the truck turned over several times he jumped free and sustained only a few bruises, which were treated at the Cottage Hospital. He was able to leave later for his home in Portland.

Wasco Damage Limited

Gordon C. Brown, who returned Tuesday from an investigation of water damage to orchards of Wasco county in the vicinity of The Dalles, states that injury is limited to cherry trees. Except in isolated instances where trees were located in unfavorable places, Mr. Brown thinks the Wasco county orchards will make a full recovery from the extreme cold. He says:

"Lambert cherries seem to have stood the frost better than other varieties. Damage, however, to Bing and Black Republicans is nominal. Royal Annes seem to have suffered more than any other varieties. While the district has no peaches, and practically no apricots this season, the trees are making a fine growth and a big crop is predicted for next season."

Bells Praise Roads

Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Bell back Monday in time to see the last of the paving laid on the roads from McMinnville to Tillamook. They motored down to the Tillamook beaches on an outing.

"We saw no section where the road construction exceeds that between these two points," said Mr. Bell. "The road from Tillamook to Seaside, however, is rather bad going, as it remains rough gravelly. We saw many Hood River people while away. John L. Henderson, now practicing law at Tillamook, was glad to show old Hood River neighbors the sights. Oscar Frederberg, another former resident, also lives at Tillamook. He is engaged in the foundry and is one of the district's prosperous citizens. We saw a host of Hood Riverites at Cannon beach."

Rubes Win Base Ball Game

The Hood River Rubes, a base ball team composed of orchardists and ranchers, defeated the American Legion team Sunday by a score of 7 to 3. Hart pitched for the city players and Hubbs caught. Hank Fanned 18 men.

The Rubes used three pitchers, Bell, Frank Dehman and Pug Dehman. Shoemaker was the rural catcher. Next Sunday the Hood River team will visit White Salmon for a game with the strong aggregation of that city. It is planned to take along a large motor party of rooters.

Cycle Racers Visit City Twenty-three contestants in an endurance run from Portland to Spokane, returning by way of Seattle, passed through here last Thursday on schedule time. The riders stopped here briefly for oil and gas. Rider of cycle No. 17 created a sensation when he became confused in an effort to find an official station. Three minutes behind his schedule he turned a corner at high speed and collided with a filling tank. Damage, however, was nominal, and was soon speeding toward The Dalles.

Labold, who was accompanied west from Cincinnati by his wife, in 1887 won the Kentucky Derby race at Louisville, his purses reaching an approximate \$100,000.

He got into the wrong tree and picked several boxes of green crab apples."
