THE JAPANESE QUESTION AGAIN

The Business Chronicle of Seattle in its issue of Saturday, September 25, devoted a large part of its columns to a discussion of the Japanese question. The problem was discussed from a one-sided viewpoint, that of the American business concern engaged in export or in greeting the business of foreign importers. In a foreword to articles by Samuel Hill, Reginald H. Parsons and others, the publisher of the Business Chronicle said:

Of more instant importance than the fight on radicalism, the coming elections, or any current problem of the day in American affairs is the grave situation now suddenly arising out of the anti-Japanese agitation.

Do thinking and responsible citizens want to see the Pacific coast torn by a bitter racial controversy in which emotionalism, detraction, reason and prejudice supplant facts? Will they longer negatively encourage a propaganda of sinister origin that is placing in jeopardy the commercial future of Seattle? Do they propose to stand passively by while the United States as a nation becomes innocently and unintentionally embroiled with a friendly country being goaded beyond endurance?

Mr. Hill proclaims as non-constructive agitators those who voice an opposition to Japanese settlement of land in this country.

Just so long as Japanese are permitted to come in contact with the white citizens of our Pacific coast states on an ever increasing scale, just so long will friction be aroused. Japanese and Whites are entirely different when it comes to race. A few Japanese in a community never create any disturbance, but the moment the Japanese become numerous and enter into commercial channels, then the friction becomes evident. The time has arrived when the national government should and must take a frank stand toward a settlement of the Japanese question. The bars against Japanese exclusion must be made as tight as they now are against Chinese.

It is not a question of equality or inequality. Just as Senator Harding said in a recent address to a delegation of California citizens, it is a question of racial difference. There can never be an assimilation of Japanese who come here. Their presence in large numbers will lead to a friction that will become more and more embarrassing to us and to the Japanese nation itself. Japan should cooperate to the fullest with

America in eliminating this Pacific coast irritation that may, if allowed to run too long, grow into a national fever.

The voice of those who are opposed to Japanese in this country is not representative merely of a few agitators, as Mr. Hill and Mr. Parsons would have us believe. It is the voice of a people. Mr. Hill and Mr. Parsons are representative of a minority. According to their light, which looks on the world as a market place, they are entirely right in their arguments. The Pacific coast people, however, have passed the point where they will brook any such argument. They want to be freed from the unpleasantness of contact with an ever increasing number of alien peoples.

The city has had 52 cases for infraction of traffic laws since Mr. Murray was employed. Most of them have been for minor offenses. The county has had a far smaller number of cases. Citizens are getting to the point where they respect traffic laws and wish to inform themselves on all points, in order that they may not violate any rules. With less than a week's preparation P. L. Manser and Ralph Davies went down to Salem and took \$100 in prizes with the county exhibit at the state fair. What would some real exhibits bring in? To the success of last week John Koberg, with his numerous vegetables, of non-pareil quality, contributed more than any other single individual.

The county officials have had much annoyance in the construction of the concrete market road in Odell. They have handled the situation in an admirable manner, however, and the orchardists of the district, we are sure, appreciate the worries and pains that have been taken to get the highway ready for apple hauling.

In his reply to Samuel Hill and Reginald Parsons on the Japanese question last week R. E. Scott cited that 65 Japanese married couples furnished 25 per cent of the birth increase in a population of 8,000 last year. It is a reflection on the white couples. They need a Teddy Roosevelt to stir them up.

These are the days when the apple grower puts the reverse English on Ben Franklin's advice, "Early to bed and early to rise." The orchardist retires late and rises early. Probably the course will not make him healthy and wise, but he must go contrary to Poor Richard's advice or lose some apples.

The apples that best Hood River's product in a show must be such fruit as tempted Eve and caused Adam to succumb. We take off our hats to Wasco county. But we advise that the Wasco growers do not permit their glory to go to their heads. Hood River wasn't trying down at Salem.

Politics will have little chance at Hood River between now and election. The candidate that appears on an apple orchard place and starts to electioneer will likely have a picking bucket offered him. If he makes good on a ladder the apple grower may condescend to vote for him.

Made Time of Gay Reunion

"Floating the bounds" was a specially important duty in the colonies, where land surveys were imperfect, land grants irregular, and the boundaries of each man's farm or plantation at first very uncertain. In Virginia this "floating" of the bounds was renewed that were becoming obliterated; blazes on a tree were somewhat grown over—they were deeply recut; piles of great stones containing a certain number for designation were sometimes scattered—the original number would be restored. Special trees would be found fallen or cut down; new marking trees would be planted, usually pear trees, as they were long-lived. Disputed boundaries were decided upon and announced to all the persons present, some of whom at the next "floating" would even be able to testify as to the correct line. This processioning took place between Easter and Whitsuntide, that lovely season of the year in Virginia; and must have proved a pleasant reunion of neighbors, a May-party. In New England this was called "perambulating the bounds," and the surveyors who took charge were called "perambulators" or "boundsmen."—Alice Morse Earle in *Child Life in Colonial Days*.

Life of Chilean Girls.

The Chilean girl's reason for being is marriage, and one of her earliest lessons is that woman's place is indeed the home and that man is ordained her master, the World Outlook says. Old maids have a particularly horrid time in Chile and most of them take the veil. There is little else for them to do, for they can't all become school-teachers and no other career is open for the young woman who does not marry. Women journalists, doctors, lawyers, stenographers and clerks are practically unknown.

Perhaps this somewhat oriental ideal of Chilean womanhood explains why the tinkling of the piano rather than the clicking of typewriter keys is the chief mechanical noise one hears at the Santiago College for Girls, and why the most important exercise is an exhibit of fine needlework and hand-painted china rather than essays on "Why the Woman Needs the Vote."

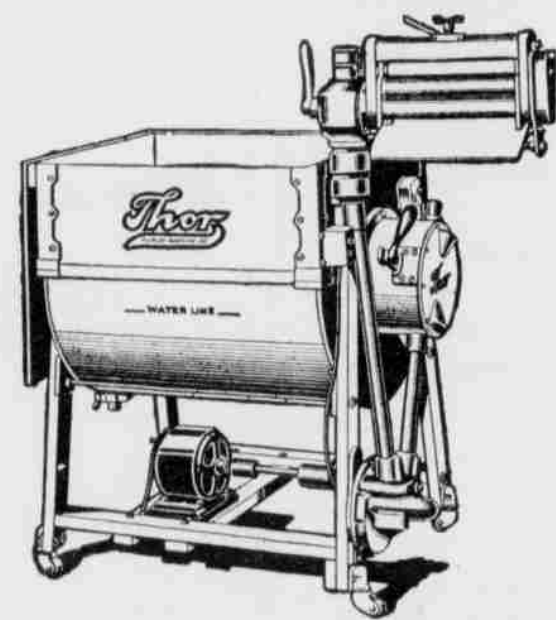
