An acre with a like production would yield 400 bags of potatoes, it is said. While the vines of potatoes of high yield are usually small, Mr. McGuire's potato vines have been of enormous growth. He pulled one vine that measured seven feet and 1 1/2 inches. He has also produced some very fine cucumbers. He picked a cucumber Monday that weighed 2 1/2 pounds.
