DACY SUPPORTED

My reason for urging the voters of Oregon to elect Robert N. Stanfield United States Senator are very definite and specific. First and foremost, it appears to be accepted as a fact that Harding will be elected president, and a Republican president would be practically helpless in carrying out his party's policies unless he has the support of a Republican senate. Mr. Stanfield is a loyal Republican and will, if elected, back up Harding as president in his efforts to restore genuine American government.

Another reason why Mr. Stanfield should be elected senator is found in the fact that Oregon as a state is overwhelmingly Republican. Look at the registration figures. At the present time there are approximately 250,000 registered Republicans and 100,000 registered Democrats. With such a preponderance of Republican sentiment it seems absurd that the state should be represented in the senate by any except a Republican senator.

I am for Mr. Stanfield for senator because the present Republican majority in the senate is only one vote, and if Mr. Stanfield is elected he may be the very vote which would give the Republicans control of that body. On the other hand, if his Democratic opponent should be elected the latter vote might be the very vote that would turn control of the senate over to the Democrats.

Another ground for supporting Stanfield is furnished by his attitude on the League of Nations issue. Mr. Stanfield takes the stand that there should be an agreement among the nations to preserve the peace of the world. He believes that such an international association should be based upon international laws and that a general international conference should be called whenever peace shall be threatened. He believes that our relations with the other nations of the world should be such as will enable the United States to perform its full duty to civilization and humanity without, however, surrendering the right of the American people to exercise its judgment in favor of justice and peace.

Mr. Stanfield's unequivocal stand in favor of passage by the senate of the Soldiers' and Sailors' Relief Bill is an example of the direct manner in which he takes his stand on public questions. Mr. Stanfield is a native son of Oregon and deeply understands her needs. He is anxious to aid in securing federal support for such vitally important Oregon enterprises as irrigation, road construction, livestock, lumber and other industries.

Having experienced in his own business the effect of excessive railroad freight rates, Mr. Stanfield fully appreciates the necessity of encouraging the development of ocean-borne commerce. He favors the adoption of an emergency police looking toward the improvement of Oregon's rivers and harbors, and in the Voter's Pamphlet has shown his realization of the imperative necessity of free tolls.

EDDY HAS CHARGE
OF LOOP WORK

W. T. Eddy, who has been on forestry road work at Waunder the past year, has been assigned to making a permanent survey and to supervise slashing of this end of the Mount Hood Loop Highway. Accompanied by a party of five Mr. Eddy passed through here Thursday en route to the Upper Valley, where a camp will be made. Slashing crews, who will open the six-mile stretch of the road up the canyon of the East Fork, are expected here soon.

Mr. Eddy says it is planned to make the Hood River end of the Loop road ready for grading next spring.

FINE OF VISITING
MOTORIST REMITTED

Harry McCoy, young White Salmon orchardist, paid Hood River a visit one day last week. He parked his machine on Oak street and proceeded to purchase goods at the stores. Returning to his machine he discovered that it had been standing at the curb in a restricted parking district for more than 30 minutes and he was arrested and taken before Recorder Howe. The latter assessed a fine of \$5. Mr. McCoy paid without protest, but later indicated that shopping in Hood River was too expensive.

A second chapter in the episode occurred an hour or two later when representatives of the Merchants' Association and Commercial club interviewed Mr. Howe and persuaded him to remit the fine.

Rains Damage Trout Lake

R. H. Cole, rancher of Trout Lake and Waunder, here last week on business, stated that the recent continued rains have caused a heavy loss among members of the Trout Lake section. The late crop of alfalfa was ruined for many ranchers.

"We were able to save ours," says Mr. Cole, "only by rushing it to a hastily constructed silo. My brothers who are interested with me in our ranch and a neighbor are now feeding a carload of cattle. We feel that we will be able to make more by feeding a time than in selling on the market at present depressed."

E. C. Anderson has just purchased from E. D. Blanche a brick business structure on Oak street, consideration \$7,500. With the exception of the purchase of the Blanche building by the R. of P.
