"I am going home to see my old mother," stated I. Yamada, West Side Japanese church Thursday. "She's getting old and wants to see me once more."

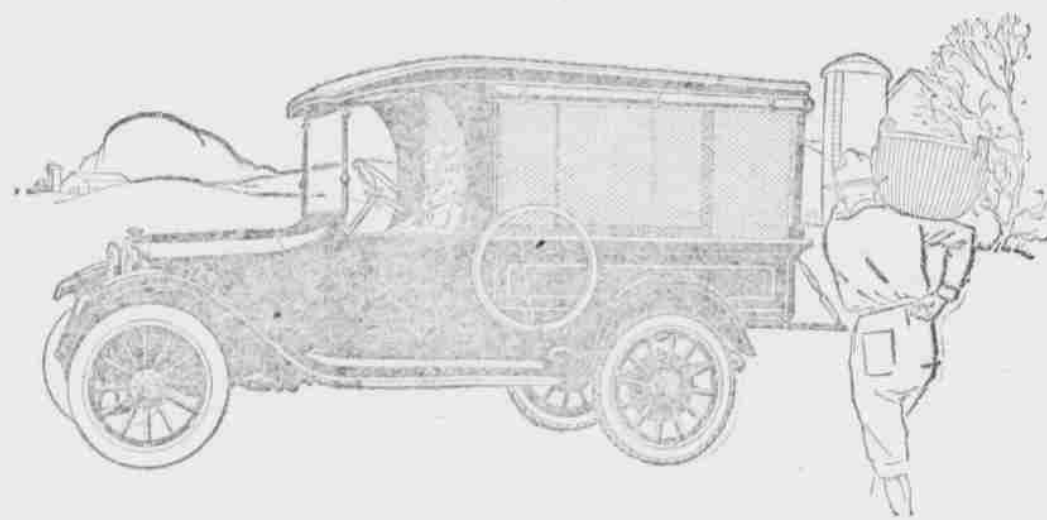
