Norman MacLeod, of the Northwestern power plant, has purchased the J. J. Conger orchard of 19 acres in the Pleasant View district.

Trustees for the Columbia Fruit Union, with headquarters in this city, are to be chosen at an election of the Union to be held Saturday, November 27, in the Commercial club rooms. Other business of importance will also be taken up at the meeting. The Columbia Fruit Union was recently organized with increased capital as the success of the White Salmon Valley Fruit Growers' Union.

Another dam for the storing of irrigation waters is being constructed by Herbert Williams of North White Salmon, on the 40 acres he recently purchased, known as the Nelson place, near the Mowery Bros.' ranch.

The location of the dam is said to be a natural one and formerly was a lake bed until drained a few years ago. The formation of the ground makes the construction work light as only a small fill at the lower end is necessary. Already 12 feet of water, stored from springs, covers an area of three acres. The addition of the second dam, which is to be connected with the old dam by a pipe line, will enable the storing of a large amount of water in both dams for irrigation of the orchards on the Williams and Osborn places during the summer months.
