COMMERCIAL CLUB NAMES CANDIDATES

At a nominating meeting of the Commercial club Friday night candidates for the directorate were named as follows: Dr. J. D. Guttery, R. W. Kelly, C. O. Huclat, F. H. Blackman, A. W. Peters and Geo. I. Slocum. Three of these nominees will be elected to the board at the regular December meeting, to be held Monday night, December 29. Retiring members of the board are C. J. Calkins, J. M. Culbertson and A. S. Keir.

At Friday night's meeting J. H. Fredrick proposed an amendment to the constitution that will permit the general membership of the organization to choose a president and vice-president, making the selection from the directorate of seven. At present the chief officers are chosen by the board itself. Mr. Fredrick also proposed that the club name be changed to "The Hood River County Commercial Club" and that representation in members be secured from all outlying valley sections.

It was announced at the meeting that further action toward securing a local interstate bridge across the Columbia seemed improbable.

SIGN CAMPAIGN IS UNDER WAY

A committee of the Merchants' Association, consisting of E. E. Brett, H. C. Hall and Earl Franz has begun a campaign for better road signs in the county. It is also proposed to erect comprehensive signs on the Highway at both the east and west entrance of the city calling attention of tourists to the orchard district and mountain landscapes that may be seen by a drive of a few minutes to the south.

Because of lack of comprehensive signs along the Highway the past year it is estimated that several thousand motor tourists have passed through Hood River without knowing the beautiful orchard districts were within a few minutes' ride.

FIREMEN CLEAR \$200 FROM ANNUAL BALL

The 16th annual ball of the fire department, held Thursday night at the Pythian hall, was considered the most successful social event the fire lads have ever attempted. More than 150 couples were present at the hop, and many purchased tickets who were unable to be present. The firemen cleared \$200 from the dance.

Land Clearing Predicted

The Hood River Spray Co., which has just taken the agency for the Dupont powder concern, is expecting a revival of land clearing this fall and winter. Inquiries of orchardists, it is said, point to more work of this character than for some time. During the past year more than a score of small tracts of logged off land have been sold by the Oregon Lumber Co. in the Woodworth district. Most of the purchasers will clear a portion of the places and plant pear trees, with strawberry fillers, it is said. In outlying districts of the Lower Valley growers are contemplating the increase of strawberry acreage. Indications point to an extended shortage of Clark Seedling strawberry plants, so heavy will be plantings for the next year.

5,000 Shingles Shipped By Mail

Tuesday of last week the Tam-A-Lum Lumber Co. began shipping shingles by parcel post to S. C. Johnson, of Spray. The order, for 5,000 shingles, was completed Saturday.

"We would willingly have shipped all the shingles at one consignment," says F. Davenport, "but the postal regulations, where the destination is on a star route, will permit us to ship only 1,000 shingles a day. The postage for each of the 25 bundles of shingles ranged from 41 to 50 cents."

Volstorff Injured By Auto

John Volstorff was painfully bruised Thursday night when struck by an automobile driven by Dr. F. C. Brosius. Mr. Volstorff, whose garage is on the west side of Twelfth street, was on the opposite side of the street repairing the lights of a small black automobile. With no lights showing Dr. Brosius, on his way to town, struck Mr. Volstorff before he saw him, hurling him about 15 feet.

Mr. Volstorff holds Dr. Brosius blameless in the matter.

K. A. Pierce Has Stroke

K. A. Pierce, Cascade Locks sawmill worker and amateur photographer, was discovered at his apartments last week suffering from a stroke of paralysis. It was believed that he had lain in a helpless condition for more than a day unable to summon aid. Neighbors noticed him absent from places he was accustomed to visit, and entered his quarters where he was found stricken speechless. County authorities placed nurses in charge of him. Nothing is known of his relatives, but it is thought he has a brother in Kansas.

Dee Flat Road in Bad Shape

The stretch of county road connecting the Dee Flat orchard district with the outside world, ravages of analysis declare, is in a serious condition and appeals have been made to county authorities. It is feared that injuries of winter rains may isolate the district. County Roadmaster Nichols, who has inspected the road, is undecided as to the method of making repair. It is thought by some that a re-routing over a new grade should be made.

The Game Protective Association

will probably urge improvement of the Dee Flat road, which connects the Lost Lake road with the county road system.

Mt. Adams Crop Light

Horner A. Greene, manager of the big orchards of the Mount Adams Fruit Co., of Gilmer, and here over the week end, says the last of his crop has been delivered to the shipping point. He says his harvest was only 20 per cent of last year, when 25,000 boxes of apples and pears were marketed. The yield this year was as follows: 6,100 boxes of apples, 1,600 of Anjou pears and 40 tons of Bartlett's.

"We sold our Apples at good figures," says Mr. Greene, "realizing the following prices: Extra fancy, \$3.75 per box; fancy, \$3.50, and C-grade, \$2."

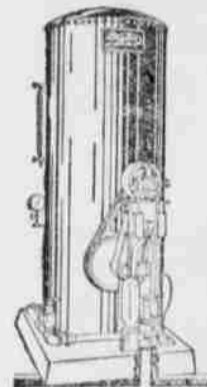
