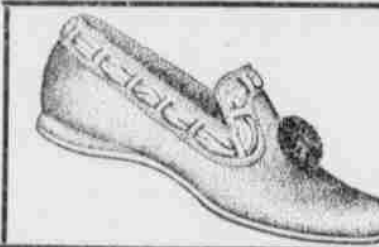

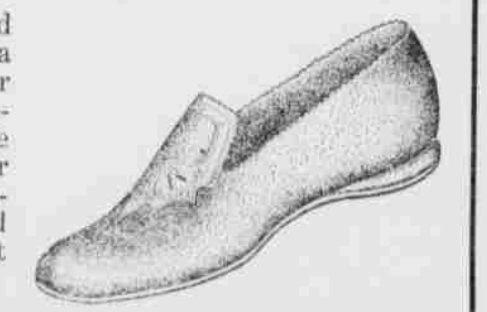

THE WEATHER

None of us has any apology to offer for the weather this year. It is typically an Oregon wintertime product. The rain may come a little harder than some of us may wish, but it is reasonable. We do not mind it. Oregon is noted for its winter rains and the sunshine of its summers.

Once in every half century or so we are visited by such a freeze as that of December, 1919, when the east wind blew like a Dakota norther and the temperature did not stop until it reached the low mark of 27 degrees below zero. We have such visitations just to show us how fortunate we are the most of the time. It is difficult for us to realize that a year ago three feet of Arctic snows were piled up around our homes and that we were stoking furnaces while at home and wearing all the overcoats, wool socks and mufflers the house possessed when facing forth for work at the office. Those were disagreeable days for Oregonians. They are worth remembering just to show us what fine weather this is we have recently been having.

ORGANIZATION BENEFITS

The peculiarities of this season in apple marketing demonstrate conclusively the value of cooperative organizations. A glance at other apple districts shows how impossible it is to finance the harvest and marketing of the big apple crops in years of slow markets without organization. As a result growers in districts renowned for independent methods of sale are now trying to raise the umbrella of organization. It is like the man who gets suddenly religious when he thinks he is going to die. He backslides rapidly on regaining health. These organizations born during lean years of apple marketing will probably last until buyers offer tempting prices.

The apple district where a good organization prevails through fat years and lean will surely reap the benefits of such organization.

GRASSHOPPERS

During the late (we use the word advisedly) days of frenzied finance it seems that the brains of many learned how to do the goose-step when thinking of dollars. It is hard for these persons of the grasshopper type to get back to normalcy. The following, taken from Harvey's Weekly, is evidence of a persistent foolishness:

"Pity the poor retail clothing dealer! The irresistible cry throughout the nation, says a recent clothing store advertisement, is 'Lower Clothing Prices!' And, in response to this 'irresistible cry,' one of the greatest chains of men's furnishing stores in the greatest city of the nation has (to imagine) reduced the retail price of its derby hats to \$17.50, 'without war tax.' (No, gentle reader, not \$17.50 a dozen; 17.50 apiece.) These are indeed sorrowful days for the retail clothing dealer.

We are thankful for our sensible merchants here in Hood River. They promote sensible buying. We believe they would order a sanity commission if anybody visited their stores and called for a \$17.50 hat.

The meanest trick we have recently heard of occurred Saturday when someone stole a cake and plate from the Woman's Relief Corps at the Knights of Pythias hall. It was a despicable trick. The cake was intended for veterans inmates of the Roseburg old soldiers' home. If the thief has a sense of patriotism his conscience will inflict the severest penalty.

The toll of accidental death, due to careless operation of automobiles, grows daily more shocking. Serious or fatal injuries are reported almost daily from Portland. Why spend large sums in the prevention of disease and permit such a heavy toll from carelessness? Severe penalties should attach to such carelessness.

Parents should cooperate with officers in preventing their children from coasting on the business streets. A serious, perhaps fatal, accident was narrowly avoided the other evening when children coasted in front of a fast moving automobile. The kiddies have no business on the streets with their wagons.

Burnt cork makes one think instantly of a minstrel show, but the plight of flame-swept Cork of old Ireland is one of grim tragedy.

We have heard no compliments more pleasing recently than those uttered by Edward A. Jordan, president of the Jordan Automobile Co., in a recent address to the Portland Chamber of Commerce. Mr. Jordan said, in painting word pictures of Oregon's glories:

Stand for a moment with me on the slopes of the Hood River Valley and resist, if you can, the golden rippling sunshine on an October afternoon. From one horizon to the other the sumptuous scale of color sweeps the orchards in zones of tints with transitions from golden red to warmest violet. In the midst of this quivering splendor the yellow gold poplars fringe the land of the Spitznberg, the Delicous and the Yellow Newtown Pippin.

Daily, according to press reports, prohibition sleuths are capturing wildcat distillers. But the business is profitable and others replace those confiscated. The moonshiner will operate just as long as he can find a profitable market for his wares.

We may wish to prevent an influx of Japanese to this country, but none of us will object to the benign influence of the Japan current.
