## POMONA GRANGE PROPOSES STORE

Hood River county grangers at a meeting of the Pomona grange held at the old Pythian hall Wednesday of last week subscribed \$2500 of a proposed \$10,000 capital for a grange cooperative store. State Master Spence and State Executive Committeeman Burnett were present at the conference. About 150 orchardists and members of their families attended the session. They participated in a banquet at noon. A legal committee with a representative from each district grange in the county, was appointed to arrange details of the proposed store, which will deal in groceries and feed.

## MRS. ROSE SHELLEY, PIONEER, PASSES

Funeral services for Mrs. Rose Shelley, pioneer, who died the preceding Tuesday at her home in Portland, were held at the graveside, Idlewild cemetery, Thursday, Rev. J. L. Hershner officiating. Mrs. Shelley, aged 77, was a native of Wurtemberg, Germany. She came to America, settling in Pennsylvania, with her parents in 1854. After a residence of 12 years in Pennsylvania, where her parents died, Mrs. Shelley moved to Michigan. There she was married to Joseph Fletcher. Mr. and Mrs. Fletcher came to Hood River in 1881, the former dying the following year. Mrs. Fletcher was married to J. M. McCoy, who died in 1899. His widow was married in 1902 to Roswell Shelley, who died in 1910.

Mrs. Shelley for 50 years had been a member of Presbyterian and Congregational churches. For the past 12 years she had divided her time between Portland and Carson, Wash. She is survived by three stepchildren, Mrs. Milton D. Odell, of Odell, and Hugh and Ralph D. Shelley, of Portland. F. C. Sherrieb is her brother. A surviving sister lives at Erie, Pa. Mrs. Agnes Jones, another stepdaughter, passed away several years ago.

### Joe Steinhardt Optimistic

Joseph Steinhardt, of Steinhardt & Kelly, of New York, wired the Daily World, of Wenatchee, last week that the demand for extra fancy box apples is greater than ever before in spite of the big eastern barrel crop. Steinhardt is the man who is financing H. G. Bohlke in his sensational, but benevolent, career on Wenatchee apples.

Mr. Steinhardt says about this deal: "I want to tell you that the financing of his tremendous deal with the Bohlke Fruit company has not been a joy ride over the Columbia Highway. However, we have now turned the corner and we are on the home stretch. If we don't come under the wire as winners it won't be Joe Steinhardt's fault."

"With the grower in the saddle, where he should have been three years ago, and a good native-raised horse running it (H. G. Bohlke, manager of the Wenatchee District Cooperative Association) I see no reason why the local talent should not bring home the purse."

"If the growers have not the nerve to emancipate themselves and their industry and have not enough vision to appreciate the fact that the only way they can make a success of the industry is by hanging together, they deserve all they get and then some."

### Facts on War Risk Insurance

Soldiers, sailors and marines and their dependents in every community want to know the facts about government insurance. Over \$500,000,000 in insurance was carried by the service men of the state of Washington during the world war. Unfortunately many through misunderstanding, misrepresentation and other causes have permitted their government insurance to lapse.

After December 31, 1920, and up to July 1, 1921, all those desiring to reinstatement, regardless of the date of their discharge, must furnish evidence of insurability satisfactory to the director of the bureau of war risk insurance based on a full medical examination to be furnished with the application for reinstatement.

All who carried war risk insurance while in the military service and a letter leaving the service allowed it to lapse are eligible to make application for reinstatement. Many are not aware of the foregoing and there are only a few days left in which those who were discharged less than 18 months can reinstate without a medical examination.

### Cow Has Hydrophobia

Ranchers fear that a coyote, infected with hydrophobia, may have bitten a dog on the Corwin ranch. The Corwin dog was shot, its owner thinking that it was suffering from the effects of numerous porcupine quills imbedded in his mouth and nose. Later, however, a cow develops a disease which was diagnosed as hydrophobia. No dogs of the district have been reported as ailing, and no case of hydrophobia has been reported here. Coyotes infect the foothills, and these animals may have brought the disease from eastern Oregon, where hydrophobia occurs frequently.

### Apples Shipped to Manila

A shipment of several thousand boxes of apples shipped from here last week by the Apple Growers Association to Vancouver, B. C., where they were loaded aboard a steamer for Manila, P. I. The apples are of the Newtown variety.

### Portion of New Grade Graveled

A motor truck crew last week began resurfacing a stretch of the Highway between here and Mosier with gravel. The link to be improved, about three-quarters of a mile long, extends from the point where the new road intersects the old East Side grade to the top of the Columbia canyon east of the city. Motorists using the new grade say that it remains in fair condition.

### Winter Golf Club Considered

A number of enthusiasts are considering the organization of a winter golf club. During the past week a number of players have visited the sandbar north of the city. With the sand wet and packed the players declare the big bar an excellent course. During summer months the sandbar for most of the time is covered with water.

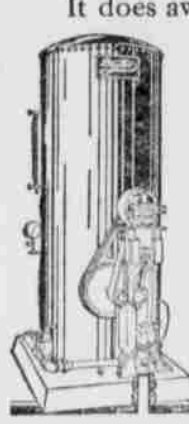
