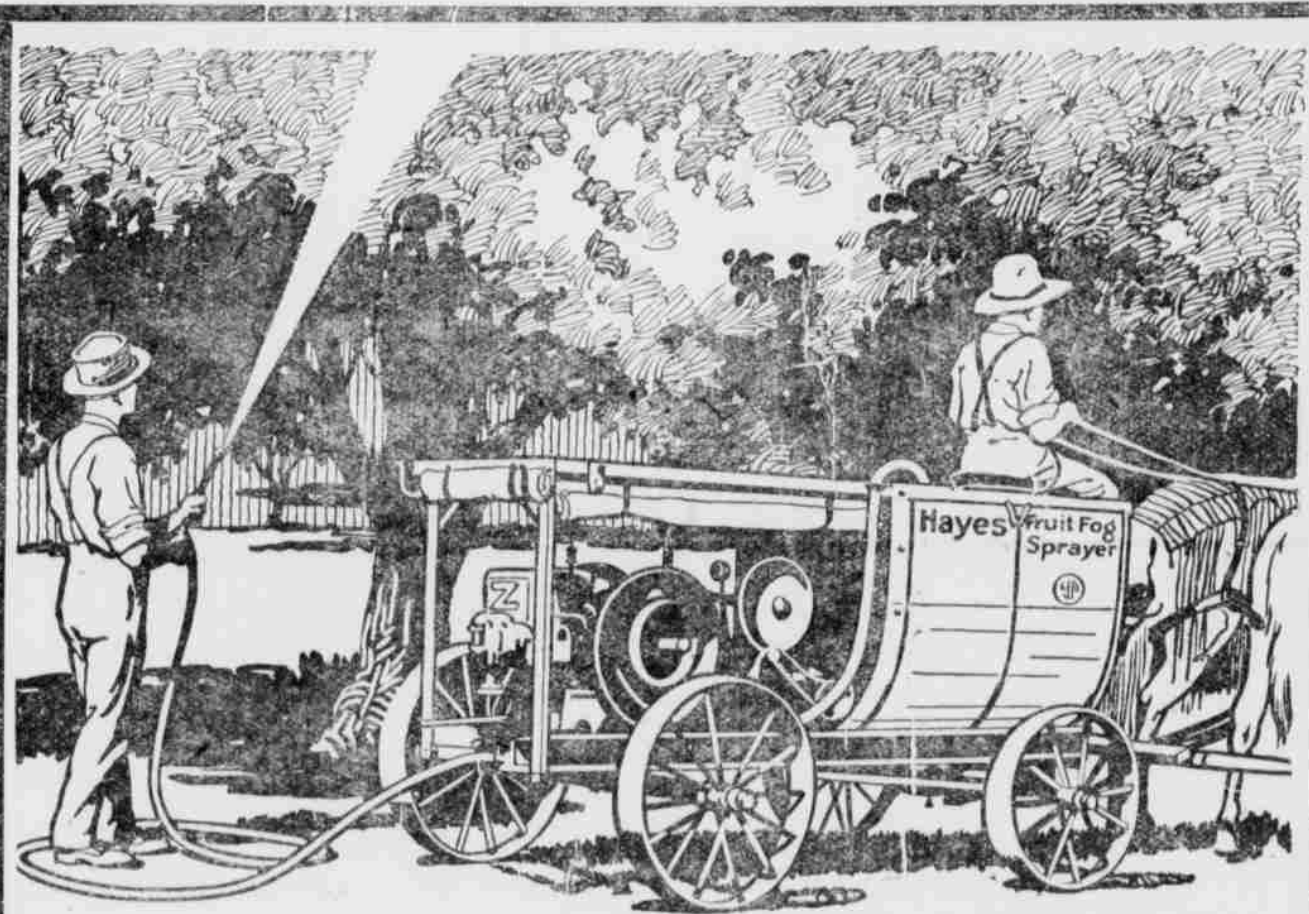

### 60 HORSES TEN YEARS AGO, ONLY ONE TODAY

Ten years ago the Fashion Stables maintained 60 head of horses in their barns. Today they have but a single horse, "Old Dan," a pensioner. Their patrons today all demand automobiles—this, all but Dr. M. E. Welch, who drives "Old Dan" when he has a call to some valley ranch. Dr. Welch has the last remaining horse, which has been with the stables for more than a decade, rented by the year.

Ten years ago the stables did a big business renting horses and traps to youthful swain for their Sunday afternoon or holiday drives with the community's young women. The youth of today drive automobiles of their own. The livery concern now operates a string of for hire cars and three big buses. Its harness, rooms are now stored with tires and automobile accessories.

A community Christmas entertainment sponsored by the Women's Club is the plan for Christmas eve.

Word was received here Thursday of the death of Wm. Peterson at Vancouver. Mr. Peterson was recently stricken with paralysis and has been unconscious since that time. He was a member of the local Masonic and I. O. O. F. lodges, who took care of him upon learning of his illness. The funeral was held at White Salmon in charge of the Masonic lodge. Deceased was a well known rancher of the Pleasant View district.

Mary Zimmerman, the 17-year-old daughter of Mrs. J. H. Zimmerman, died suddenly Friday afternoon, December 10, at the family home, a ter a short illness of only two days. The funeral was held Sunday at the Pleasant View schoolhouse, with burial in the I. O. O. F. cemetery in North White Salmon.

Col. Walter T. Bates, brother of Dick Bates, of Bardon mountain, has been detailed in command of the Eighth U.S. Infantry at Coblenz, Germany. This is considered the finest infantry regiment in the world. Col. Bates has been in Germany since November. Before that time he had been stationed in the adjutant's headquarters in Washington, D. C. Col. Bates has risen in rank rapidly, before the war having had a captain's commission. He owns a ranch on Bardon mountain adjoining his brother's and visited here last spring.

"The Peace Tangle," a new book by John F. Bass, president of the White Salmon Fruit Co., has just been published by the Macmillan Co., of New York. The volume is exciting widespread favorable comment because of the comprehensive way in which Mr. Bass has handled the subject, the present international situation. Mr. Bass traces recent diplomatic history from the secret treaties entered into by various nations through the Paris Peace Conference and the subsequent period. He also devotes special chapters to conditions in Germany, France, Italy, Austria, Hungary, Czechoslovakia, Poland, Russia, the Balkans and Turkey.

### Boys Caught Shoplifting

Three rural youths, all under age, were apprehended last week while shoplifting at the store of M. Yasui & Co. While two of the boys engaged the attention of clerks in another part of the store their companion filled his pockets with gloves and belts. Authorities restored the articles stolen and no arrests were made. The identity of the boys has not been given out. Sheriff Johnson says, however, that the case may come before the juvenile court, as other merchants have also lost articles, suspicion attaching to the same youths.
