The brilliancy of the star first attracted the attention of Miles Curtor Venus's brilliance attracted Portland folk, According to Prof. Daniels, of Hill Military Academy, the planet is now near the greatest elonga-tion of its orbit and at a point which places it between the earth and the sur. Although Venus approaches nearer the earth than at present, its lumin osity now is very marked.
