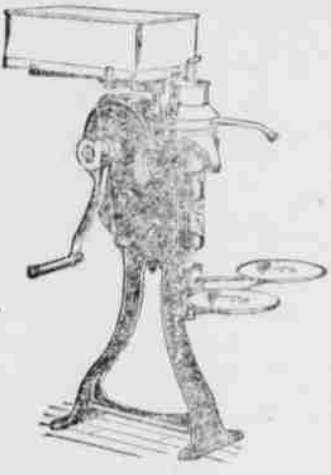

**EX-HOOD RIVER GIRL
IS MAKING MARK**

In an address to the members of the Woman's Club last week Mrs. H. F. Davidson, just back from New York City, told of the work Miss Lena Newton, a former Hood River girl, is doing at Columbia University and in Americanization activities in settlement schools in the metropolis. Miss Newton is a graduate of the Hood River high school and the University of Oregon. She is now employed jointly by the federal government and Columbia University.

Miss Newton, Mrs. Davidson said, is supervisor of Columbia students, who expect to become teachers. She supervises their practice work in some 40 settlement schools. She also is supervisor of community houses, where the young women live. Miss Newton has made a remarkable reputation for herself, said Mrs. Davidson, although she is not yet 30 years old. Many of the students under her are older. She has been called the past year to address assemblies at Vassar, Smith, Wellesley, and Mt. Holyoke.

Miss Newton is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Newton. Mr. Newton was formerly associated with Mr. Davidson in the box manufacturing business.

**HO SING BEING
HELD FOR RANSOM**

Charles Gumm, Chinese restaurant owner here and chef at the Mt. Hood Hotel, declares that his old home country has "shadows" who are bolder in their operations than American criminal artists. Charles has just received a letter from China telling of the kidnapping of Ho Sing, who formerly associated with the local restaurant man and who left last fall for a vacation. Sing had worked without rest for 10 years. He had saved about \$4,000. He is being held for a ransom of this amount, and Charles Gumm believes that after a series of bargaining conferences with the pirates he will be released.

Then, according to Charles, Sing will lose no time in getting back to America, where he can make more money. Sing on his return to the Orient last fall was accompanied by an aged uncle, Yong Fu, former Salem merchant, who expected to spend his last few years in his native province.

The boy died within an hour after arrival at the hospital.

Funeral services were held Saturday, interment following at Idlewild cemetery.

Guy is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Brubaker, a sister and three older brothers. The family came here recently from Portland, where they resided for three months, having originally lived at Glendive, Mont.

Farrell Brings Frost News

Harry Farrell, who has spent the winter in New York City, engaged with H. F. Davidson in the latter's export office, has just returned to Hood River with the report that the recent frosts over eastern and middle western fruit districts has taken a heavy toll of fruit crops. The winter of the eastern and middle western sections was comparatively mild, but the late frosts caught the fruit buds unusually advanced. The Missouri apple sections, Mr. Farrell says, was heavier than elsewhere, and the crop will be almost a total loss.

The decrease in the eastern production of all kinds of fruits, Mr. Farrell says, will naturally stimulate an early demand for northwestern box apples.

Bonded District to be Formed

By a vote of 63 stockholders for and 13 against, the Middle Fork Irrigating Co. has decided to sell its stock to a bonded district. While the date for an election for formally organizing the district has not been set, the sentiment as expressed in the stock company's action insures that the district will be formed. The ditch will be operated this year, however, as a stock concern.

By the organization of a bonded district, ranchers of the community say, a large area of irrigable land that at present derives a benefit from improvements of the stock company, will be made to share the costs of the development.

Gross Leases Smith Building

H. Gross has leased for a term of five years all of the Smith building except the two stores occupied by the Slocum-Domberger Co. and A. S. Keir. Mr. Gross states that he does not anticipate removing to the new quarters until he is forced to vacate the structures he now occupies. His removal, however, will probably be forced within a year, the Butler Banking Co. contemplating a new building on the site he now occupies.
