

### BERRY MARKET MEN PREDICT PRICE DROP

While C. R. Winslow, H. B. Finch and W. A. White, representatives of Robinson & Co., fruit merchants, who have headquarters at Minneapolis and who distribute through the Dakotas and Intermountain sections, here last week to investigate strawberry crop conditions, express the belief that berry prices will show a heavy decrease over last year, they do not anticipate that the price of Clark Seedlings, as grown here, will show a decline proportionate to other commodities. The Robinson Co. for a decade has handled practically all of the carlot shipments of Clark Seedling strawberries grown here and in Washington mid-Columbia fruit sections. They returned the Apple Growers Association an average of \$4.38 per crate, a record price for the fruit, last season. "We are simply out on a scouting trip now," said Mr. White. "We are buying nothing and we can tell nothing about price. It is true, however, that the purchasing power of the population in the territory that we serve, just as in other sections of the country, is far below last year, and you can expect a drop close to 50 per cent in prices. But your growers of Hood River are especially favored in that you have a fruit unexcelled in shipping quality and you are so closely aligned in a co-operative shipping organization that you can distribute your fruit to the best advantage."

Mr. White pointed out that express rates were going to be very high this year, an increase having been granted transportation companies after the crop of last season had been moved. He stated that it would cost \$1 per crate to deliver berries at middle western points the coming season as compared with 55 cents for pre-war days.

The Canadian territory will not appeal as a distributing territory because of the heavy duties imposed and because of the disparity of exchange.

Mr. White says he believes a campaign should be waged to encourage housewives in buying heavily of fresh strawberries and canning them at home. He does not anticipate a keen demand for canning concerns, a feature of last year's strawberry deal, as the canners still hold heavy stocks.

### PIONEER WOMAN'S FUNERAL SATURDAY

Funeral services were held at 10 o'clock Saturday from the residence of her daughter, Mrs. Geo. T. Prather, in the Summit district, for Mrs. Alvira Elizabeth Reynolds, aged 81, who died Thursday night. Rev. J. L. Hershner officiated, interment following at Idlewild cemetery.

Mrs. Reynolds, a native of Wheeling, West Va., came to Astoria with her family in 1876. Later the family resided for a time at The Dalles, coming here in 1881. Mrs. Reynolds died in 1921. Other children surviving are: Mrs. Frank L. Davidson, of the East Side, and Frank Reynolds, of Portland. The funeral was directed by S. E. Bartmess.

### Winans Has Another Petition

W. R. Winans was here yesterday seeking signers to a petition to Portland officials and asking that they reconsider their objections to a proposed road from Lost Lake over Lolo Pass to the highway penetrating the south side of Mount Hood to Government Camp. Mr. Winans says that the distance is only a few miles. The forestry service, which has already cut a wide trail the most of the way over the pass, Mr. Winans declares, is in favor of the proposed road.

Mr. Winans says that Portland originally opposed the Lolo Pass road on the ground that her Bull Run watershed might be contaminated. He declares, however, that data can be produced showing the road will not endanger the water system.

### Forestry Crews Not Yet Busy

Stanley C. Walters, in charge of forest reserves of this county, states that the forestry service will not begin work of completing the last mile of the new Lost Lake Highway before June 1. When Jake Lenz, in charge of forestry crews last year, recently began work on the county's portion of the new highway, it was erroneously concluded that the forestry service had again become active.

"The forestry crews," says Mr. Walters, "will not be able to get busy until the deep snowbanks of the region melt, and this will be well on in June. We plan on finishing the new grade this season."

### Mosier Work to Begin Soon

R. A. Josling, in charge of the office of the A. D. Kern Construction Co. at Mosier, where the concern has established headquarters for paving the Columbia River Highway between here and Mosier and several miles to the east of the latter town, says rapid preparations are being made for laying "hot stuff." The company's crusher and paving plant will be located at Mosier. All preliminaries will be finished by the time the conditions will permit laying the surfacing.

Mr. Josling states that traffic will be permitted over the new grade during hours when crews are not at work.
