Notice of Street Improvement. Pursuant to the order of the Common Council, contained in the Ordinance No. 609 of the City of Hood River, passed by the Common Council May 15, 1921, and approved by the Mayor on the 15th day of May, 1921, notice is hereby given that the undersigned City Recorder will receive bids for the im-

provement of the following named streets. FIFTH STREET. A cement curb and gutter on the West side of 5th Street from the North line of Oak Street to the South line of Cascade Avenue; 5th Street from the North line of Cascade Avenue to the South line of Columbia Street shall be graded to grade, cement curb and gutter on the West side of 5th Street and surface graded between curb lines.

SIXTH STREET from the North line of State Street, North to the middle line of Broadway Street shall be graded to grade and a cement curb and gutter on both sides of said portion of State Street and said portion of 6th Street shall be graded between curb lines.

SEVENTH STREET from the North line of Oak Street to the South line of Columbia Street shall be graded to grade and a cement curb and gutter on both sides of said portion of 7th Street shall be graded to grade and a cement curb and gutter on both sides of said portion of 7th Street.

EIGHTH STREET from the North line of Oak Street to the South line of Columbia Street shall be graded to grade and a cement curb and gutter on both sides of the street and gravelled between the curb lines.

NINTH STREET between the North line of Cascade Avenue and the South line of Columbia Street shall be graded to grade and a cement curb and gutter shall be constructed on both sides of said portion of 9th Street and the surface between the curb lines shall be graded.

TENTH STREET between the North line of State Street and the South line of Sherman Avenue and the North line of Eugene Street shall be graded to grade and a cement curb and gutter shall be constructed on both sides of said portion of 10th Street and the surface between the curb lines shall be graded.

ELEVENTH STREET between the South line of Sherman Avenue and the North line of Eugene Street shall be graded to grade and a cement curb and gutter shall be constructed on both sides of said portion of 11th Street and the surface between the curb lines shall be graded.

SHERMAN AVENUE between the East line of 6th Street and the East line of Lot "H" in South Addition to the City of Hood River shall be graded to grade and a cement curb and gutter shall be constructed on both sides of said portion of Sherman Avenue and the surface between the curb lines shall be graded.

HAZEL AVENUE between the East line of 9th Street and the West line of 10th Street shall be graded to grade and a cement curb and gutter shall be constructed on both sides of said portion of Hazel Avenue and the surface between curb lines shall be graded.

MAY STREET from the West line of 12th Street to the West line of 13th Street shall be graded to grade and a cement curb and gutter shall be constructed on both sides of said portion of May Street, and a cement sidewalk 4 feet in width shall be constructed on the South side of May Street and the surface between curb lines shall be graded.

THIRTEENTH STREET from the South line of State Street to the North line of May Street shall be graded to grade and a cement curb and gutter shall be constructed on both sides of said 13th Street and the surface of said portion of said 13th Street between the curb lines shall be graded.

FIFTEENTH STREET between the North line of Cascade Avenue and the South line of Columbia Street shall be graded to grade and a cement curb and gutter shall be constructed on both sides of said portion of 15th Street and the surface between the curb lines and the surface between the curb lines shall be graded.

Sealed proposals for the work will be received at my office up to 8 o'clock p. m., June 6, 1921, and the Common Council will at its next regular meeting after the completion of the publication of this notice, to-wit: On the 6th day of June, 1921, at the Council Chamber at the hour of 9 o'clock p. m., proceed to open and consider all bids for said work, which is ordered by the Common Council by said Ordinance No. 609, duly enacted as above specified; that the improvement will be let in one contract, and will be required to be completed within thirty (30) days from the date of the awarding of the same to the successful bidder, who will be required to furnish bond to the City of Hood River in a sum of not less than 25 per cent of the estimated cost of the contract for the faithful performance thereof; that complete specifications are on file in my office covering the improvement to be let. Bids are called, which may be examined by prospective bidders upon application, or copies thereof will be furnished upon the deposit of \$5.00 to insure the safe return to the City of Hood River after the awarding of the contract, and said contract will be awarded to the lowest and best bidder upon said specifications.

The City reserves the right to reject any or all bids, or to waive any defects therein, for the benefit of the City of Hood River. The terms of the specifications shall be notice to prospective bidders and the requirements demanded by said City in the performance of said work.
