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BUSINESS WOMEN'S CLUB ELECTS

The members of the women's organization expressed unanimous approval of the proposed \$350,000 road bond issue. One of the initial activities of the new women's club was cooperation with the city council to secure for a park a small triangular plot at the west edge of town, where Cascade avenue and Oak street intersect and form two thoroughfares for Highway traffic through the city. The women defeated a move calling for utilization of the triangle for signboard purposes. They will beautify it. They have also planned beautification of an approach to the concrete Highway bridge over Hood river.

JACK ANDERSON TO GO TO WEST POINT

John H. Anderson, world war veteran and former Hood River school boy, last week received instructions to report July 1 at West Point, where he will take a 4-year military course. Mr. Anderson, who is 23 years old, was assigned to a military school last year, while he was a member of a cavalry regiment stationed at Washington. He passed a competitive examination with a high mark early in the year. He has been home on a furlough with his foster mother, Mrs. J. H. Dukas, for the past several weeks.

Mr. Anderson was a member of Troop A, Oregon Cavalry, on the Mexican border. He was overseas with a field artillery regiment, sustaining wounds in action. At the time of the armistice celebration Mr. Anderson was in a hospital near Paris and was in the city on leave when the great news broke. Later he was one of the Oregon men present at the Paris meeting when the American Legion was organized.

Large numbers of people from this section and Underwood are planning to drive to Stevenson, June 12, to take in this celebration.

Auto Park Is Crowded

The Hood River free auto camping park of three acres, established last year, is far too small to accommodate the large number of motor tourists seeking a rest of a night or day or two. On several recent nights over 70 cars, with an average of four passengers, stowed on the one-covered plot. All of these were located for the night.
