LOCAL FERRY IS . BEST ON RIVER

The new ferry, the Cleona, named for Misses Cleo Johnson and Leona Van Allen, daughters of the owners, J. M. Johnsen and Homer G. Van Al-len, is declared by widely experienced motorists to be the best on the Colum-bia river. The craft is declared one of the best in the Northwest.

Last Thursday the Glacier man was driven to the boat landing by George C. Gladden of the Mt. Hood Motor Co. A new Nash was taken for a trial trip across the river. All agreed that the new boat was capable of handling the traffic between the Columbia River Highway and the North Bank, a traffic that is growing heavier every day Highway and the North Bank, a traffic that is growing heavier every day. Mr. Van Allen is pilot of the new boat. He is proud of it. Since putting the Cleona in commission he says he wonders how he ever handled traffic with the old Panama.

The Cleona is of a size that gives the passenger a sense of utmost security. The windiest day on the Columbia doesn't cause her any worry. She is

doesn't cause her any worry. She is equipped with a huge 30 H. P. semi-Deisel engine, which burns crude oil. The powerful motor chugs steadily ahead, and doesn't change her tune in the least, even though a wave submerges the paddles. The boat is 56 feet from stem to stern to stern. feet from stem to stern. She measures 22 feet, inside measurement, from star board to larboard.

The Cleona is equipped with electric lights. She is double ended, and no matter which way she is traveling, she is going straight ahead. The boat has carried 12 big automobiles and two has carried 12 big automobiles and two saddle horses at a single load. While the owners were designers of the new craft, she was built by A. S. Sheplar, formerly one of the owners of the ferry system, who has made a name for himself as a ferry boat builder, having built the Panama, which the Cleona succeeds, and other craft.

The new boat is equipped with electric lights, generated by the big motor.

Editor Glacier: The governor ap-cointed a committee of three as per a esolution of the recent legislature to nvestigate and report additional sources of taxation so that the 1923 legislature would have some place to get more money to run the great state of Oregon. Along comes Wm. L. Fin-ley, known to most nature lovers, in an open letter to the governor and suggests that the state raise some money from the fishing industry. The salmor pack for 1920 totaled over \$12,000,000. The last legislature appropriated \$91,-300 of the taxpayers' money to raise more fish for the salmon packers to The state collected over \$50,000 in angler's licenses, which money goes to the state hatchery fund, according to Mr. Finley, also to raise more fish for the commercial interests.

The United States government collects \$12,500 a year from the Columbia River Packers' Association for seining privileges off Sand Island near the mouth of the Columbia river. The state of Minnesota collected \$105,000 from commercial fishermen who secured from the waters of that state carp and other trash fish which the fishermen sold for \$275,000.

What kind of business are the people of Oregon in that they can afford to raise \$150,000 from the taxpayers in order to subsidize the salmon packers of the state of Oregon? What is the argument used on the legislature that the salmon packers are entitled to this money at the expense of the rest of the state? Tax Ferret.
