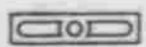

### LEGION POST SEEKS BIG MEMBERSHIP

The Hood River Post of the American Legion is now engaged in a membership campaign. The personnel of the organization of ex-service men has been divided into three teams, with the following captains: Banks Mortimer, Don Metzger and Harold Blackman. The contest will close March 1 and within two weeks afterward the members of the two losing teams will furnish the winning team with an evening of entertainment, the form of which will be later decided upon.

The Legion Post here last year had 208 members. It is declared that the aim of the present drive will be to bring into the Legion all ex-service men of the valley.

It has been asked that the name of every city and valley ex-gob, Marine or doughboy, not already a Legion member, be given to the captain of one of the contesting teams.

#### Dr. Boyd is Dead

Dr. John Hardgrove Boyd, professor of homiletics in McCormick Theological Seminary Chicago, and pastor of the First Presbyterian church in Portland from 1911 to 1919, died last Thursday night in the Presbyterian hospital in Chicago after a relapse of several weeks' duration that followed an illness of some 18 months.

Dr. Boyd had preached here and had many Hood River admirers.

### STRAWBERRY TRACTS MUST BE INSPECTED

County Fruit Inspector Armstrong states that a law, adopted last year by the legislature, providing for licensing of nurserymen, will apply to all growers who sell strawberry plants. It is the custom of many berry ranchers to sell strawberry plants, according to Mr. Armstrong, and the new law will result in much inconvenience, it is said.

Sales of strawberry plants have been further restricted by an order just issued, by Chas. A. Park, president of the State Board of Horticulture, and approved by Governor Olcott, which necessitates the inspection of all tracts from which berry plants are to be sold. The order results from the prevalence of strawberry weevil in numerous sections.

The ruling requires that all fields be inspected at least two weeks before the date on which it is intended to remove plants. A certificate of freedom of diseases will be issued in case the inspector finds the berries in healthy condition. In case of presence of the pest, the tracts will be quarantined. Common carriers are prohibited from accepting for shipment any berry plants, which do not carry a certificate of inspection from the board of horticulture.

### ICE FLOWS INTER- RUPT RIVER SERVICE

Floating ice fills the Columbia, interrupting the operation of ferry boats. The river steamer Madeline, loaded with 2,000 cases of locally canned apples, left Monday for Portland, the cargo destined for transfer to the steamer Mexican, which will carry them to Glasgow. The river boat had to proceed cautiously because of the ice flows, and it was anticipated that trouble might be experienced in getting through the locks at the cascades. Agent Comlard says the boat will not attempt to make the up-river trip again until the ice flows cease.

#### City Appointees Unchanged

The personnel of city appointees the coming year will remain unchanged. Officers are: William Hart, marshal; M. E. Webster, night marshal; W. T. Price, water superintendent; E. C. Smith, attorney; A. Samuel, street commissioner.

The council will endeavor, if legal means can be provided, to prevent the placing of signboards along the city extension of the Columbia River Highway. A sign, now being erected at the west edge of the city, has aroused some of the city fathers, and the judiciary committee has been asked to confer with the city attorney in an effort to find means of abating the sign as a nuisance. The council will also draw an ordinance providing for the condemnation of old unsightly frame buildings in the restricted fire district.
