GOLF MEETING TO BE HELD TODAY

A meeting of golf enthusiasts will be held today for the purpose of financing a proposed golf club on the Oak Grove place of Herman Pegg. The local golfers express the belief that the Oak Grove ranch may be purchased by sale of bonds. The ranch comprises 150 acres, with a plot sufficiently large for links already cleared. The tract is valued at \$20,000, and the owner, it is stated, is willing to aid in fostering the golf links plans by taking \$5,000 in bonds.

Citizens express enthusiasm over the golf club plans, declaring that links here will be an asset in aiding with the development of the district's scenic asset. The course, too, it is declared, will increase visitors to local resorts.

These April showers are a little too cold for May flowers, and yet it is astonishing how the early wild flowers are braving frigid rains and snow squalls.

Monday, when snow squalls and rain showers alternated, moments of brilliant sunshine were interspersed to remind mid-Columbia residents that it was really April. How many uttered expressions of thanksgiving over the fact that winter was ending rather than beginning?

The temperature in the Upper Valley during the month of March ranged from one degree below zero, on March 1, to a maximum of 56 degrees above, according to Col. W. S. Dowd, cooperative weather observer, who was here Saturday on business. The total March snowfall reached 19 1/2 inches. The total precipitation was 3 1/2 inches.

"On March 24," says Col. Dowd, "we were treated to a remarkable display of the aurora borealis. The sky was fairly well lighted up."

Wintry blasts of the past week, cold rains and occasional snow flurries have not prevented the blooming of spring flowers. Early wild currants in the west of town are bursting into bloom. East of the city protected coves are ablaze with rock lilies, dogtooth violets and other species of early-blooming wild flowers. Numerous parties have braved the inclement weather on flower picking excursions and almost every home has its decoration of wild bouquets this week.

Reports of motorists over the Highway Monday indicated anything but mid-spring weather in the vicinity of Cascade Locks. During the afternoon a fierce snowstorm raged, and the slushy blanket covering the pavement caused numerous skidding accidents. Two automobiles, according to J. R. Nickelsen, piled up in the ditch with broken wheels.

Mr. Nickelsen says that numerous slides tumbled down the canyons onto the Highway and that crews were kept busy patrolling the road. No slides were serious enough to block traffic, however.

MEETING WITH DOCK COMMISSION CALLED

A. W. Stone, who characterizes the approaching session as one of the most important recently called for participation of fruit growers, has issued a call for a conference of apple growing and shipping interests with the Portland Dock Commission next Monday.

Mr. Stone is urging as many local growers as possible to be present at the meeting. He anticipates that a large delegation of growers of the Willamette valley and southern Oregon will be present. Growing and shipping interests of Mosier, White Salmon and Underwood will attend the meeting.

Mr. Stone is the chairman of a committee of apple shipping interests recently appointed to secure an inter-district cooperation of fruit growers for the solution of general problems that confront the industry as a whole throughout the northwest. The fruit men will meet at the Portland Chamber of Commerce at 9.45 o'clock Monday morning and proceed to the dock commission's office at 10 o'clock. An audience will be made, it is said, to formulate some definite plans for the construction by the dock commission of municipal storage plant for use by Oregon and Washington apple shippers.

During the months of January, February and March, 74 permits have been issued by State Engineer Copper, for the appropriation of water from streams throughout the state of Oregon. The permits cover the irrigation of 10,160 acres of land, the development of 1803 horsepower, and the use of water for mining, municipal, domestic, and various other purposes. The estimated cost of construction work under the permits is approximately \$213,000. During this period, four permits to construct reservoirs for the storage of 741 acre feet of water were issued and the estimated cost of construction work is \$15,000.

In Hood River county, permits have been issued to M. Louise Wygant, of Portland, covering the appropriation of water from an unnamed spring for domestic purposes, to cost approximately \$700.

In case spray cannot be applied until that date, it will probably be best to cut down the strength from 8 gallons to 100 to 6 gallons to 100.
