#### BETTER BORDEAUX OIL COMBINATION

(By Leroy Childs)

R. H. Robinson, agricutlural chemist from the State Experiment Station, Corvallis, has been in Hood River the past week working with Mr. Childs on the problem of improving and stand-ardizing methods of preparing the

Bordeaux-oil spray.

A number of orchards were visited and many growers were found to be making a faulty Bordeaux, especially where the hydrated lime is being used. A better Bordeaux is found by adding the milk of lime, or the hydrated lime if this is being employed, first. This is a charge from the former recom-mendations which called for the placing of the dilute bluestone solution in the tank. After the lime is added to the tank, the first material to go in, the tank should be filled at least twothirds full, the bluestone solution should then be added. This should be in a very dilute form, at the rate of a pound to two gallons of water, and added very slowly to the dilute milk of lime already in the tank. During this process the agitator should be run vig-orously. The oil should then be slowly

A number of growers were found placing the pure oil directly into the tank. This is a serious mistake in that much free oil is found in the prepared spray and which might prove inurious to the trees. This oil should be thoroughly emulsified by pouring an equal amount of water into the oil, stirring well until a white, creamy mass forms.

Growers must remember that the preparation of Bordeaux and the Bors deaux-oil combination is one that re-

It was declared by Mr. Molden and others that the proposed short lateral road will benefit Portland, Hood River and The Dalles, and numerous speakers declared that Multnomah, Hood River and Wasco counties should assist in financing the proposed road. It was cited that the request of the Yakima good roads boosters should be backed, for it inaugurates a new spirit of cooperation between the highway commissions of the two states.
