THE APPLE INDUSTRY

In view of the reports of recent frost damage throughout Atlantic states, we wonder if the northwest horticultural experts who recently have been advising a change from apples to various soft fruits are not a little too zealous in their urgings.

Here in the northwest we have an occasional abnormality of the elements, such as the cold weather of December, 1919. These visitations, however, judging by past history, occur only about once in a generation.

Here in the northwest the apple growers must contend chiefly with the vagaries of human nature instead of with the elements. If orchardists will but put into effect general inter-district cooperative efforts, they will reap more of the profits from the apple business.
