MOSIER WILL HAVE 200 CARS APPLES

While the spring season was extremely dry, E. D. Mosier, manager of the Mosier Fruitgrowers Association, says he anticipates the warm summer and fine growing season will result in a harvest at the normal time.

Mr. Mosier says: "Our apple tonnage should run about two-thirds of last season, or around 200 cars. Our Newtowns will be light, but our Spitzenburgs are heavy. We will have a few cars of delicious, Ortolys and Arkansas Blacks."

"We are now winding up our cherry season with about 100 tons as against 75 tons last year. Royal Annas are going to the canners, while the blacks are being shipped east. Pears here bloomed heavily but did not set well. We will not have in excess of 5,000 boxes in the district, nearly all Anjou and Bosc. Italian prunes promise about 15 cars, which will be shipped packed in 17-pound suitcases."

Mosier is one district in the Northwest where every grower is a member of the Association. The orchardists of the section are looking forward keenly to the visitors who will come here from the Seattle convention. The delegates will be taken on an automobile ride from Hood River to The Dalles. They will stop at the Association's large packing house and storage plant, en route, and will also be taken on a tour of the grove sections.

WHITE SALMON CROP 50 PER CENT SHORT

The White Salmon district this year, according to A. E. Mills, county horticultural inspector for Klickitat county, will not reach over 375 cars as compared with 500 last season. Mr. Mills, who has inspected every orchard of the White Salmon section, says:

"Our decline is due to the general shortage in Northwest, which are only about 50 per cent of last season. Spitzenburgs are very heavy in all sections. The crop of this variety is at least 25 per cent better than last season. All other varieties are about normal."

"We have a very heavy crop of pears, but our acreage is limited. The district should ship 30 cars as compared with 20 last year."

"The strawberry crop was a bare 25 per cent. Although we have a 50 per cent increase in acreage, we shipped but 14 cars."

"An effort is being made to sign up growers of the White Salmon section on a cooperative basis. It is proposed to handle the bulk of the White Salmon tonnage the coming year through a pool."

CHAUTAUQUA NETS

APPROXIMATELY \$50

A net sum of approximately \$50 was realized by the Hood River Chautauqua Association, the programs of which were ended last Thursday night. As the organization is not seeking a profit, the funds will be turned over to the city for the improvement of the park on which is located the open air theatre in which the chautauqua is held.

The association, composed of 40 citizens of the city and valley, signed for the return of the Ellison-White entertainers next summer. The chautauqua concern has agreed that the programs of next summer will not conflict with the usual activities of the Fourth of July season. This conflict this year diverted attention from the chautauqua.

Galloway Finds Oregon Good

"Never did Oregon look so good to us as now," declared Geo. Galloway, Frankton orchardist, who is just back from a visit with friends and relatives in Wisconsin and Minnesota. "This little warm weather we have been having is nothing. Oregonians ought to get back there to the Middle West and dwellers awhile. Then this would be ideal summer weather."

Mr. Galloway and his family were also on the edge of one of the terrible mid-western cyclones, which left death and destruction in its wake.

"I have heard Oregonians complain about their winds," says Mr. Galloway. "They ought to say, 'God be praised for it.' It is a wind that tempers our winters and summers. It is benign and does not destroy. Give me Oregon every time."

Better Parking System Wanted

Citizens and authorities are urging that Hood River adopt a new system of parking automobiles on main business streets. The present system calls for setting of the machines at an angle. The result on days when all available space on both sides of streets is taken makes a lane so narrow that two cars have difficulty in passing. Numerous accidents are precipitated, too, it is said, when the parked cars are backed out into the streets.

It is suggested that cars should be made to park parallel with the curb, thus eliminating the necessity of backing out to get started. The clear space, too, will be much wider, it is cited.

Legion Delegates Are Named

The American Legion Post has elected the following delegates to the annual state encampment to be held at The Dalles the latter part of the month: Edw. W. Van Horn, Kent Shoemaker and Fred H. Bell. Alternates elected were: Basil Mortimer, Walter Ford and Harry W. Farrell.

It is anticipated that an approximate 100 Legion men will attend the convention from this city.

Yakima Road Soon Open

Reports of residents of northern Klickitat county, Washington, are to the effect that the progress is being made on the last few miles of a new Glenwood-Yakima road, and that the entire route will be open soon. Local folk, who contributed \$1,000 toward the new Washington highway, declare the new route, which will cross the Klickitat river and the gorges of tributaries, will open up one of the most scenic sections of the Northwest.

To Whom It May Concern: Whereas, the State Game Commission of the State of Oregon is authorized under Section 8, Chapter 66, General Laws of Oregon, 1921, to close any open season or open any closed season in any county or district of the State of Oregon for the shooting and possession of game animals and birds: Notice is hereby given that the State Game Commission of the State of Oregon has made and entered and does hereby issue the following

Order

That the open season as defined in Chapter 103, Section 2, of the General Laws of Oregon of 1921, for hunting, killing, taking or having in possession, alive or dead, the following named game animals and game birds respectively, shall be as follows to-wit:

The open season for deer throughout the entire state shall be and is hereby declared to be from August 20th to October 31st of each year, both dates inclusive.

The open season for quail and Chinese pheasants in all sections of the state where there is an open season, is declared to be from August 20th to September 20th of each year, both dates inclusive.

The open season for grouse or native pheasants in all sections of the state where there is an open season, is declared to be from August 20th to September 20th of each year, both dates inclusive.

The open season for prairie chickens in all sections of the state where there is an open season, is declared to be from October 15th to October 31st of each year, both dates inclusive.

Notice is also hereby given that the changes in the open seasons made by this Order in no wise affects the bag limits or other regulations provided by law respecting the hunting of, killing, taking or having in possession, alive or dead, of such game animals and game birds.

Any and all persons hunting for, killing, taking or having in possession, alive or dead, any deer, quail, Chinese pheasants, grouse or native pheasants, sage hens and / or prairie chickens in the State of Oregon, in violation of this order, will be prosecuted as by law provided.
