HIGHWAY BEING PUT ON DRESS PARADE

J. R. Nickelsen and a crew of men are putting the Columbia River Highway on dress parade. All signs along the right of way are being torn down. Where posters of signs have failed to secure permission for placing signs on private property, Mr. Nickelsen is interviewing property owners and securing the consent for removal of the boards.

"On the Edgar Locke place just east of Mitchell Point tunnel," says Mr. Nickelsen, "dozens of signs have been placed without permission. Mr. Locke has allowed us to remove the boards of trespassers. Between here and Mosier we removed a sign so large that it was necessary to hitch on to it with our motor truck and drag it down."

Mr. Nickelsen is also having roadside weeds and litter removed. In the Mosier section, where the wayside orchards of Mark A. Mayer are kept scrupulously neat, a heavy crop of weeds has sprung up on the right of way. Mr. Nickelsen now has a crew of men engaged in hoeing these out. The Highway here is being made presentable for the coming of delegates to the Seattle convention of the International Apple Shippers' Association the latter part of the month.

PENNEY IS OPENING 59 NEW STORES

The J. C. Penney Company, who have operated very successful stores here for a number of years, are opening 59 new stores throughout the country. When this has been accomplished, the nation-wide organization will then have 371 stores in all. The present expansion policy of the company contemplates still more stores next year.

The growth of the company has been remarkable. The first store was opened 20 years ago, 1902, doing a business of \$28,898.11. Last year, 1921, it had 312 stores and the gross volume of sales amounted to \$46,641,928.20.

J. C. Penney, the founder of the company, is still active in the affairs of the organization, being chairman of the board of directors.

Miller May Be Candidate

Ed C. Miller is in a quandary as to what course to pursue in getting his name on the ballot at the November election as candidate for county assessor. Mr. Miller ran as Republican and was defeated by the incumbent, Jasper Wickham. He, however, received 24 votes, a plurality, from Democrats who wrote his name in.

In his filing statement, Mr. Miller made the declaration that he would not accept the candidacy of any other party, and County Clerk Shoemaker has declined to place his name on the ballot as a Democratic candidate. Mr. Miller says he may bring mandamus proceedings to enforce such action. He has another alternative, he says of securing the nomination as an independent by action of the legally specified number of electors gathering in an assembly and declaring for him.

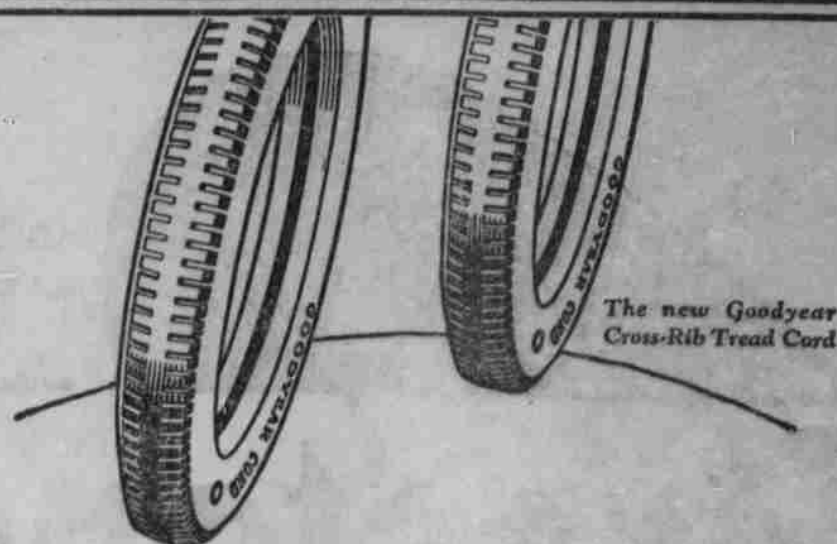
