MANY TO ATTEND APPLE CONVENTION

Twenty-five to fifty shippers and orchardists of Hood River will attend the annual convention of the International Apple Shippers' Association to be held in Seattle the latter part of this month. The fruit men of this section declare that they expect the Northwest convention, which will assemble buyers from all cities of the United States and many from England, to prove a great stimulus to the box apple industry. En route from Chicago by special trains, the buyers will stop in Spokane, Wenatchee and Yakima, where growers and dealers are arranging entertainment features. Following the convention, it is indicated from letters in response to invitations of apple men of mid-Columbia districts, the approximate 300 apple merchants, most of them accompanied by members of their families, will stop here, at The Dalles and Mosier and points in Skamania and Klickitat counties, Washington, before returning east. Among the local shippers planning on attending the Seattle convention are the following: P. F. Clark, A. W. Stone, H. F. Davidson, F. E. Oleson, J. C. Duckwall, Walter Woolpert, A. E. Woolpert, E. W. Birge, R. W. and F. S. Kelly, P. L. Tompkins, J. P. Naumes, Harold Hulbert, Harry W. Farrell, C. H. Castner, J. E. Nunemaker, J. Arthur Riggs, E. Ferguson, F. A. Massee and Geo. T. Galligan. The banks plan on having representatives at the convention.

ORCHARDISTS ARE SHY OF THINNERS

The demand for men in road camps and construction crews engaged in building the new plant for the Pacific Power & Light Co., has resulted in an acute shortage of orchard help. Although growers in instances are paying 40 cents per hour for thinners, the prevalent wage being 30 for women and 35 for men, pay higher than usual, growers have been making vain appeals to the employment bureau of the Apple Growers Association for thinning crews. Mrs. J. W. Ingalls, in charge of the employment agency, which has never been maintained in former seasons for summer help, declared Thursday that she had need for 50 thinners. "This is easy work," says Mrs. Ingalls, "and weather conditions at this season are always pleasant. The thinners, however, should provide themselves with bedding and camp equipment."

CANADIAN THISTLE DECLARED MENACE

Canadian thistles, according to orchardists of the East Side, are creating a menace. Complaints have been lodged with county authorities, ranchers declaring that the pest is growing in considerable tracts along the main canal of the East Fork Irrigation District. "If these plants are allowed to seed," says E. L. Clark, "they will be scattered by the wind into the ditch and be spread over all the valley on lower levels. A concerted campaign should be pursued by ranchers in eliminating the pest, which is causing great trouble in the Willamette valley. I noted recently that the Marion county court had appropriated \$2,500 to fight the pest there. It behooves us to kill the thistles before they get a serious hold."

ASSOCIATION GIVES REFUND OF \$85,000

The Apple Growers Association Saturday mailed checks to growers in payment of statements of final settlement on the 1921 business. Included in the final settlement was a total refund to growers of \$85,911.29. The refund on supplies reached 8.8 per cent, while growers who the past season used motor trucks of the cooperative organization in transporting their crops received a refund of 35 per cent. The Association for 1921 handled 52,174 boxes of pears, which brought the organization \$121,241, an average of \$2.33 per box. The 1921 apple tonnage reached 1,305,993 boxes, which sold for \$2,125,013, or an average of \$1.63 per box. The total sales of supplies by the agency reached \$468,000.

PORTLAND THEATRE IS A REFRIGERATOR

"If you are down in Portland on a hot day," writes Harry Duck, former local man, who is doorman at the Circle theatre, "just come around and see us. We will cool you. E. A. Franz was here the other day and gave us the once over."

Mr. Duck sent along the following clipping in explanation of his letter: Movies in the ice box have been achieved! Imagine yourself on a sizzling hot day, your collar wilted and your brow wet. Then imagine the invigorating qualities of the refrigerator. The imaginary element has been taken out of the scene by G. T. Woodlaw, owner of the Circle theatre, where he has just completed the installation of an ice manufacturing plant to cool the air that enters the auditorium of the theatre. The Circle ice factory is the first of its kind on the Pacific coast, according to "Colonel" Woodlaw, and will reduce the temperature in the theatre to any desired degree merely by the manipulation of electric switches. The ice plant, costing several thousand dollars, has been installed in a huge fresh air shaft and a constant supply of fresh air is passed over the ice and into the theatre. Just as constant is the escape of "used" air, so that ice-cooled fresh air has free circulation. Other ice-cooling devices depend upon ice from outside sources so that making it on the premises is a novelty. The Circle's machine is an elaborate contrivance with a network of pipes, tanks and motors. Exact temperatures can be maintained by simple adjustments of the mechanism. The apparatus keeps three tons of ice in the making at all times.

Morton May Develop Clay Deposit

J. W. Morton, owner of Riverside Farm, contemplates the commercial development of a large bank of potter's clay in the gorge side at the point. China and pottery experts who have examined the clay declare that it is ideal material for manufacture of dishes. The deposit will be fully explored, and if it proves large enough for commercial exploitation Mr. Morton will endeavor to interest pottery manufacturers. The clay bank was first discovered when a fringe of it was unearthed some 40 years ago by crews excavating for the line of the old O. W. R. & N. Co.

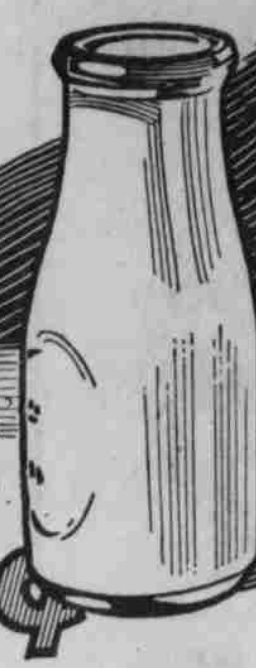
