PHOENIX CO. INVITES LUNCH CLUBBERS

L. P. Mattson, assistant superintendent of construction for the Phoenix Utility Co., now engaged in constructing the large hydro-electric plant for the Pacific Power & Light Co., in behalf of his superior, J. E. Shinn, Tuesday invited the members of the Tuesday Lunch Club and their wives to participate in a dance to be given by the officials of the construction company at the new plant at Powdermill Saturday night. Mr. Mattson stated that special rail automobiles of the Mt. Hood R. Co. will be operated between here and Powdermill for the social affair.

The crews of the Utility company, now numbering 425 men, are making a noticeable progress on excavations for a 24-mile pipeline and a dam, which will span the river three miles south of the city.
